

All-Night School Classes to be Held Before Christmas; 28 Courses Offered

Popular night school classes start Tuesday and Wednesday, September 18 and 19. For the first time this year, and following a survey, all classes are being held before Christmas. There will be 10 two-hour lessons in each of the 28 courses offered.

Different this year, too, is the method of registration. This will be no advance applications. On one night only, Friday, September 7, everyone will enroll and pay the entire fee.

Big Question
But what course to take? That's the big question each fall for dozens of people who thoroughly enjoy night school each year. Many from the district come as well. The fame of Acton teachers has even drawn students from Guelph.

The night school committee has announced the following courses for this year:

Tuesday Evening Courses
Flower Arranging—Mrs. W. G. Hayward of Guelph returns with this fascinating course. It should be better than ever this year starting so early in the season. There will be plenty of flowers from the students' own gardens before the classes on dried flowers and Christmas arrangements. Every one takes part in this class. It is not simply demonstration. Doorpieces and table centres are made as well as bouquets.

Elementary dressmaking—Very popular teacher Mrs. G. H. Edwards of Guelph will be back. Some keep coming back to this course they find so helpful. Children's clothing may be made as well as women's separates and fairly simple dresses. There is advice on patterns, choice of material, alterations and fitting. In the sewing room for all the classes there are sewing machines, ironing boards, irons and mirrors for the use of all the students.

Advanced dressmaking—More intricate patterns and different materials such as plaids or velvets are the choice in this class. Reversible skirts and dresses are popular choices.

These two dressmaking classes are always booked up so they are offered on both Tuesday and Wednesday evenings with the same teachers.

Elementary bookkeeping—Walter Pope of Georgetown, a certified public accountant, has taught this valuable course here for several years.

Leathercraft—George Bowman will teach assembly, carving and tooling—whatever the students want. Purse and wallets are favorites.

Draperies and slipcovers—The teacher is Miss Jessie Merriam of Duncan-McPhee, Guelph. She taught the course here last year. She helps with any kind of draperies, Chesterfields and couches start new lives here. The machines are available for work. She is an expert with plenty of advice.

Business practice—A new course which will include business letters, forms, business English, invoices, cheques, receipts, cash books, mortgages, public utilities, insurance, etc.

Upholstering—T. H. Briggs will again teach this class when weary chairs are torn down and completely rebuilt and upholstered. Beginners are asked to start with a simple chair or footstool, while experienced students can lug in Chesterfield chairs. There is plenty of individual help.

Hostess course—This year there is a new teacher with new ideas—Mrs. Allan McCrae of R.R. 3, Acton, a home economist from Macdonald Hall. She also teaches sewing at night school in Guelph. On her list are part-

foods, table settings and etiquette, hair styling, make-up and grooming, budgeting, freezer foods, barbecuing, and a field trip—perhaps to a woolen mill.

Advanced oil painting and sketching—Frank Black of Georgetown will again be the mentor for these artists. He always has a full class of amateurs. They are hoping to paint outdoors with the classes beginning so early.

Tailoring—Mrs. E. M. Hartley of Elora will teach elementary tailoring on Tuesdays and advanced tailoring on Wednesdays. Suits, coats and lined dresses with jackets are made here. She is well-known.

Effective speaking and leadership—High school assistant principal Michael Bevan calls on experience gained working for the CBC in this course. Its purpose is to train people in organizations and is aimed at those with executive positions in businesses, plants or even very small clubs. It proved very helpful last year.

Elementary motor mechanics—The course at Masson Motors (Prouse Motors) has just been taken over today by Peter Masson reads like this: electricity and ignition, fuel system and carburetor.

Expect 1,064 Esquering Pupils To Start in 10 Schools Tuesday

Summer holidays are drawing to a close and next Tuesday, 1,064 children in Esquering School Area No. 1 will make the trek back to schools. This year, the expected enrolment will be approximately 31 more than last year when 1,033 pupils enrolled at this time.

Three one-room schools closed their doors last June. Pupils from Bannockburn, Blue Mountain and Gibraltar schools will attend the new Central School at Limestone.

School buses will be busy on the rural roads again and both pupils and motorists are well advised to take every precaution possible to prevent an accident.

- (2) Hostess course covers party foods, table settings and etiquette, hair styling, make-up and grooming, budgeting, freezer foods, barbecuing, field trip, etc. A small extra charge will be made for supplies.
- (3) Motor Mechanics will cover minor repairs and maintenance and will be taught at Masson Motors, Acton. Fee is \$10.00.
- (4) Welding course will be given at Lincoln Motors, Georgetown, and covers both arc and oxy-acetylene welding. Fee is \$15.00 which includes all supplies used. Students will be responsible for their own transportation.
- (5) Typewriting—If you do not have a typewriter on which to practise, we strongly recommend the rental of a machine. Enquire from instructor for special rental rate for Night School students.
- (6) Power Mower and Boat Motor Repairs course will be given at the garage of Canada Tire Corporation, Acton.
