## THE TOUCH-STONE

Isa. 1:22 No. 4

Most people are familiar with the names — Martin Luther (of Reformation fame), Wm. Tyndall (translator of the Bible into English), and Justin Martyr (contemporary with the Apostle John). Not so familiar, however, is the recorded reaction of these renowned individuals to the dogma of the "immortality of the soul." We reproduce, below, their testimony (necessarily abridged for lack of space):—

Martin Luther:  
"I permit the Pope to make articles of faith for himself and his faithful—such as—the soul is immortal—with all those MONSTROUS OPINIONS to be found in the Roman dunghill of decretals."  
(Luther's Works, vol. 2, Lilio 107 Wittenburg, 1562)

William Tyndall:  
"I and ye in putting them in heaven, hell and purgatory, destroy the arguments wherewith Christ and Paul prove the resurrection. The true faith putteth the resurrection, which we be warned to look for every hour. The heathen philosophers denying that, did put that the souls did ever live."  
(Wm. Tyndall — martyred in 1536)

Justin Martyr:  
"For if you have conversed with some that are indeed called Christians, and say that there is no resurrection of the dead, but that the souls, as soon as they leave the body, are received up into heaven, take care that you do not look upon these. But I, and all those Christians that are really orthodox in every respect, do know that there will be a resurrection of the body and a thousand years in Jerusalem when it is built again, and adorned, and enlarged as Ezekiel, and Esaias (Isaiah) and the rest of the prophets declare."  
(Dialogue with Trypho, the Jew, section 80 AD 150)

Bible students of all ages, unshackled by tradition and conformity, have understood this unscriptural and mischievous dogma to be the great "he" — the "strong delusion" foretold in Scripture — the religious opium of an apostate world. Behold in this Pagan Myth nullifies the "gospel of the kingdom of God" preached by Jesus and his apostles, and therefore excludes from the life to come (Gal. 1:8, Jno. 8:32, 2 Thess. 2:8-12).
