OBITUARY

Retired Lawyer H. W. Farmer Practised Here Many Years

A retired lawyer who practised in Acton many years, Harold Nash Farmer died at Orillia, August 13 in his 73rd year.

Mr. Farmer, a rugged individualist, spent about six months of every year at his summer home at Eight Mile Point near Orillia, which he purchased in 1939. He enjoyed boating, swimming and reading.

He had been ill about 12 days before his death. He was an ardent member of the Church of England, and the funeral service was at St. John's church, Ancaster, conducted by the Rev. Langtry Williams of Long Island. Interment was in St. John's church cemetery. Pallbearers were five cousins, Dr. G. R. D. Farmer, Dr. R. D. Farmer, John Farmer, T. W. Leith and J. F. Smith and W. R. Newport.

He was the son of the late Dr. and Mrs. T. D. J. Farmer, brother of the late Mrs. I. M. Wilson of Hamilton and uncle of Mrs. George McLean, wife of Orillia's mayor.

Served in War

He was born in 1890 at Hamilton and attended Highfield School there. He graduated from Trinity College at the University of Toronto in 1911 and from Osgoode Hall. He served overseas in the first world war and on his return practised law here. He was clerk-treasurer for a time. He retired about 1934.

Last year he was one of the guests of honor at the Trinity College convocation banquet marking the golden anniversary of his graduating class.

In his younger days he was widely travelled. He was a long-

time friend of Grand Duchess Olga of the deposed royal family of Russia, who lived near here and then in Toronto until her death two years ago.

Mr. Farmer suffered a stroke at Christmas and another which led to his death.

Councillors also approved payment of \$86 to owners of sheep killed by dogs, and passed a minor amendment to the pit and quarries by-law.

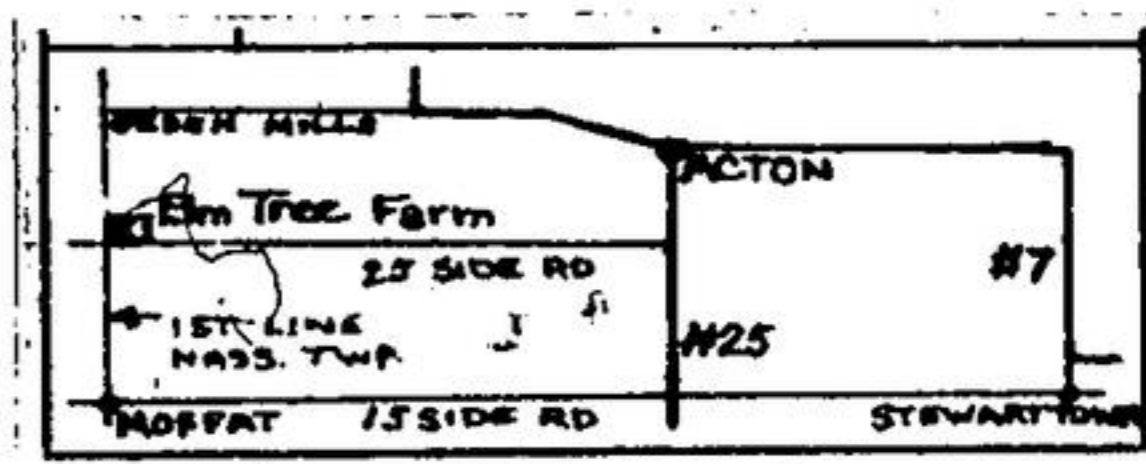
Two Hospitalized In Truck Accident
