There were senior and junior divisions in three competitions of livestock, field and horticultural crops, and farm engineering. In addition, overall championship awards were made.

In the junior division of the livestock judging there were 210 contestants. Harold Thompson, Milton R.R. 2, was fourth, Jeffrey Nurse, Georgetown R.R. 2, 12th, Bill Alexander, Norval R.R. 1, was 16th.

In the junior division of the field and horticultural crops, 168 contestants took part. In this section Ernest Alexander, Norval R.R. 1, placed eighth.

In the junior division of the farm engineering competition, Bill Alexander placed 18th.

Bill Alexander also placed 13th in the championship section. The championships are selected from the aggregate score in the three competitions.

4-H Clubs End Program

Demonstrations on fitting and showing beef and dairy cattle highlighted the final meeting of four Halton's 4-H livestock clubs. The Halton 4-H Beef Calf, Junior Holstein Calf, Senior Holstein Calf, Jersey-Guernsey Calf, and Grain Club held their final meeting in the Agricultural Hall at the Milton Fair Grounds on Friday, September 7.

Each of the 4-H club members answered questions based on livestock and crop management. The meeting marked the conclusion of a series of meetings held by each of the 4-H Clubs program in Halton is under the direction of Agricultural Representative J. Allen Francis, and J. Douglas Burnside, Assistant Agricultural Representative, assisted by the volunteer leaders of the Halton 4-H Club Leaders' Council.

County Building Inspection Finds Only Few Serious Faults

The Grand Jury at the Supreme Court Sittings held at the Halton Court House in Milton last week held their semi-annual inspection of the county buildings, and found few serious defaults.

On the inspection of the jail, the Jury commended the Governor for having done a fine job with the present facilities. The buildings are old and not well ventilated, yet the inmates advise that the food is generally good and they are well treated. The Jury said the spiral stairway between the first and second floor is extremely dangerous and should be altered. The women's section is clean, well ventilated and the facilities are good.

Door too Small
The Jury inspected the new County Building and reported that the "general layout was excellent" except for the door from the judge's room to the court room which is too narrow.

After inspecting the Manor the Jury reported "the residents are happy and pleased with their home. The recreational facilities, food, housekeeping and care were, according to the residents' excellent."

Also inspected were the Court House, Health Unit, Registry Office, and Children's Aid Society, all found to be operating in cramped and inadequate quarters.

Last in Building
The Jury's inspection was a part of the Supreme Court sittings held last week. It was probably the last assize court to be held in the present Court House, which has served the local courts for 92 years. Later this year courts will be moved to the new Court House, still under construction on the Base Line north-east of Milton.

There were 23 non-criminal cases on the docket. Four of the civil jury actions were settled out of court and the others were transferred to the next sitting. Eight of 13 divorce actions were

granted, two judgments were reserved, one was dismissed and one was held over to the next court.
