18 Counties Favor Deer Hunt But Halton Among Objectors

As announced earlier by the County Council, there will again be no deer season in Halton County this year. J. W. Spooner, minister of lands and forests, announced previously in the year that a three day deer season could be arranged in Southern Ontario for all the counties of the district, providing the counties raised no serious objections.

So far 13 of the 18 counties in Southern Ontario have objected to the deer season. Halton, Wellington, Perth, Middlesex, Elgin, Lincoln, Essex, York, Ontario, Victoria, Lennox Addington, Hastings and Prince Edward counties are opposed to the plan.

Parade, Contest, Blitz, Publicity Will Mark Fire Prevention Week

A busy, week-long celebration on school, and the boy and girl of Fire Prevention Week in Canada is being planned by members in their honor, as well as person of Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau.

The Bureau, comprising members of the county's five fire brigades in Burlington, Georgetown, Milton, Oakville and Acton, met last week to arrange a county-wide observance of the dates, October 7 to 13. This year the new slogan of this special week is "Think About Fire... Wherever You Are."

On a county basis, the Bureau is distributing 6,000 posters, 24,000 restaurant place mats bearing the fire prevention theme, and about 10,000 pieces of miscellaneous literature. A poster contest is being sponsored for Grade Five students in every Hal-

ton school, and the boy and girl winners will be given a banquet and a trophy for their school.

Inspect for Hazards—The Bureau also sponsors a blitz inspection of industrial and commercial buildings each year. The 1962 blitz will be held in the town of Oakville, with several insurance company inspectors assisting Oakville firefighters to check stores, offices, and plants for possible fire hazards.

A church parade to one of the Oakville churches is being planned, and at least 75 firefighters representing the county are expected to take part. Arrangements are also being made to broadcast the fire prevention week theme to the public through

newspapers, radio and TV stations, and roadside billboards.

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Deputy Chief George Bimdy of Milton, chairman of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau, made a strong plea to the people of Halton to assist the firefighters and help make Fire Prevention Week a success. "And remember," he said, "fire prevention is a 365 day-a-year job — everybody's job."
