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N.D.P. Vice-President Attacks P.M.'s Common Market Stand

In an address to about 100 persons attending the Halton Organization New Democratic Party rally at Oakville arena on Tuesday, September 18, David Lewis told his audience, which included a large group from town, that Mr. Diefenbaker's world trade proposal as an alternative to Britain's entry into the Common Market was "senseless, superfluous and a disgraceful performance on Canada's part." Mr. Lewis said that this much publicized alternate, which Mr. Diefenbaker pulled from his sleeve at the Commonwealth Prime Ministers' Conference, was "about as relevant as to suggest Japan is near the North Pole."

Canada, instead of whining about the effects of Britain's entry on this country, should urge Britain to ask for terms which will protect the Commonwealth's new and poor nations. "If the trade of these new Commonwealth countries is throttled, how can political ties be retained?" he asked.

Overcome Difficulties
As to the effects of Britain's entry to the E.C.M. on this country, Mr. Lewis stated, "Canada is wealthy and strong enough to overcome any temporary difficulties resulting from this situation."
