Mailman 40 Years Three Customers Same
Well-known fisherman and hunter, Clifford Meadows will celebrate 40 years of carrying the mail from Rockwood Saturdays. Mr. Meadows began in the horse and buggy days and has fond memories of making his daily rounds with his old "dobbin" and the buggy. His route takes him into Nassagaweya. Today three of his original patrons still receive the mail: William Gordon, Wilbert Darby and Stan Fulton.
Winter months provided many hazards for the veteran mail carrier when the horse was the sole means of transportation and roads were not ploughed as they are today. With the coming of the mechanized age, Mr. Meadows purchased an automobile and the mail is delivered in comfort and on time.
He holds the record for the longest service with the Rockwood carriers and can burn the midnight oil telling tales of his experiences on the road.
