## First Life Memberships Given by Museum Board

The first two honorary life memberships in Halton County Museum Association were presented Monday to Duff Alexander, whose barn is now the museum, and his cousin Bill Alexander who lives with him in the farm-house. Chairman Herb Merry, standing in front of the blazing fireplace in the museum, spoke of how the curator and board valued their help and wanted to honor the efforts of the pioneer Alexander family.

The ceremony was the last item on the afternoon meeting's agenda, so members and the cousins enjoyed tea brewed on the hob of the new fireplace. Sunacs, Japanese lanterns, and bright weeds were placed in one of the museum's big cracks as a centrepiece for a picnic bench, converted into a tea table with borrowed cups and saucers, plates of cookies and cake.

"Next time I'm going to soak you each fifty cents," declared curator Major Hal Newman as he boiled some more water over the fire. "I'm going to serve people tea to make some money for this museum."

**Gets Piano on Spot**  
He reported he had listed close to 500 items now. He has a plow which helped to break the Dundas Highway, and a bicycle so old it ante-dates the ones with one huge front wheel and a small rear wheel. It was brought to Canada from England in the 1840's. An overhead beam loom ("which the Royal Ontario Museum was after") is coming soon and a phone call during the meeting assured him he'd be getting a 105-year-old rosewood piano. People all over the county are learning of his search and he gets tips now all the time.

He reported with pleasure the first meeting in the museum when the Mountain Union W.L. answered the roll call with 40 items for display in the museum.


## Special Masses All This Week

# W. J. Beatty Presents First Canadian Shoe Style Awards

Ten Canadian shoe manufacturers were honored at Montreal with presentation of the first annual "Canadian Shoe Style awards." The awards were presented on behalf of the Lanners Association of Canada by W. J. Beatty, president, at a breakfast meeting at the Canadian Shoe and Leather Fair.

Six awards were given in the women's category, two each in three price categories. Two were given for men's shoe styles and two for teens'.

Del Grande and Denny Stewart Ltd. received awards in the \$17 and over class of women's shoes; Aird & Son and Brown Shoe Co.

also received firsts in men's shoes, while the teen category awards were received by Bonning Footwear and the Fern Shoe design of Shoe Corporation of Canada.

### Ultimate in Quality

Making the presentations, Mr. Beatty emphasized that the "Canadian Shoe Style Award" has been initiated to further the goal of making the "Canadian consumer aware that Canadian shoes, styled and manufactured in Canada, are fashion leaders in innovation."

In the past, he continued, the Canadian shoe style has been a "prophet without honor in its own country," this, Mr. Beatty stressed, despite the fact that Canadian manufacturers have been fashion leaders in numerous instances. He cited Canadian manufacturers' lead in introducing

North American women to the pointed silhouette.

### Second to None

Mr. Beatty, who has just returned from a European tour of shoe and leather centres as head of Government trade mission, reported that Canadian shoes "do not have to take second place to any other when it comes to inventiveness, design and quality."

However, he continued, the Lanners Association feels that "the image of the Canadian shoe and leather industries must and can be elevated in the public eye." He reviewed the activities of the Association, through its promotion arm Leather Industries, in building a favorable image of the industry through publications, advertising and retailer merchandising.

The Lanners Association executive announced that the awards would become an annual event and that details of the second annual competition would be circulated to the shoe industry after the first of the year.
