# Would Sell Milton Mill To County for Museum

The 106-year-old mill around which the town of Milton was founded may soon become a local tourist attraction or branch of the Halton County Museum.

Milton Council, Halton County Council, the Halton Museum Association and the 16 Mile Creek Conservation Authority have been asked to investigate the possible purchase and preservation of the flour mill on Martin St., Milton, commonly known as "Martin's Mill."

Museum Association chairman Herbert C. Merry, Deputy-Reeve of Oakville, told fellow Halton County Councillors this week that removing the equipment from the original mill to the Kelso museum site would not be as interesting as seeing the whole building in operation. In preliminary discussions with Robin Hood officials, museum representatives learned the entire building and equipment could be purchased.

Mr. Merry suggested it should be a joint project of the conservation, Milton and county officials, for though the mill would be an asset to a county museum, its history lies in with the founding of Milton in the early 1800's. He also suggested the present mill pond, which feeds 16 Mile Creek water to the mill to run the grinding wheel, should be preserved.

County councillors Merry, George Leslie of Exeter and John Milne of Nassagaveya were named a committee to investigate on behalf of county council.

Plans for the official opening of the new Halton County court house, registry office and administration building on Saturday afternoon, November 17, were made Tuesday at the October meeting of the county council in Milton.

**Martin Cuts Ribbon**  
Saturday's program includes a noon luncheon for county councillors, the administration staff and their wives and husbands; attendance of the Lorne Scots Military Band; cutting of the ribbon by Dr. C. A. Martin of Milton, Warden of the County; a tour of the building; then a luncheon provided by the Milton chapters of the I.O.D.E.; and a friendship hour.

Meanwhile, as final work progresses inside the building, and the county staff prepares to make the mass move from the Brown St. Court House to the new building on the Base Line, councillors are still making final decisions on the structure and equipping of the building.

**Enlarge Dais**  
The dais in two court rooms has had to be enlarged, doorways leading from the Judge's rooms to the court rooms are to be widened, and arrangements are being made for a flagpole and a pylon with the building's name.

Once the old court house is cleared of offices and equipment, the jail quarters are to be expanded and renovated. Governor E. G. Ryder has been asked to make a plan of re-development to provide additional jail facilities, and the plan is to be approved by the Minister of Reform Institutions.

# County Council Briefs

At the October meeting of Halton County Council Tuesday, members:

- Learned J. L. Blair, Burlington's Industrial Commissioner, had been chosen chairman of the Halton Industrial Committee, with Deputy-Reeve W. F. Hunter of Georgetown, vice-chairman.
- Received a report from the road committee that automatic protection will be provided at the CPR crossing on the Base Line west of Milton.
- Awarded contract to D.C.B. Gravel for \$9,250 worth of gravel for the Trafalgar-Burlington Town Line; and one to Holman Const. Ltd. for \$3,600 for crushed gravel for the same road.
- Awarded tenders to Robson Coal Co. of Burlington for stoker coal at \$12.75 per ton, and to Bell Bros., Milton, for fuel oil at 14.5 cents per gallon.
- Appointed N. M. Boyd to the permanent jail staff.
- Renewed membership in the Association of Ontario Counties and delegated the Warden and two members to attend the convention.
- Reviewed final plans for a county council "outing" at Oakville Deputy-Reeve Herb Merry's cottages in Victoria Harbor October 19 and 20.
- Endorsed a town of Oakville resolution calling for parents to be held responsible for willful damage done to public buildings by children.
- Heard a report on the sale of \$1,000,000 in debentures, half on the Canadian market and half in United States.

# One Dead, Two Injured As Three Cars, Deer Meet

Three deer and three cars got themselves tangled up Sunday and Monday nights, and the result was one injured deer, two dead bucks and a lot of "dough" spent on car repairs.

Sunday, Clarence Ford of R.R. 4, Milton and Robert Hepburn of R.R. 6, Milton were proceeding along Highway 25 south of Speyside when two deer ran across the road in front of them. Mr. Ford's car hit one deer, and the Hepburn car hit one deer, and the Hepburn vehicle ran over one, causing damage to the undercarriage of the car. Total damage was \$300.

Then on Monday, a car driven by a Toronto man suffered \$200 damage when a deer walked in front of it as it proceeded along Highway 401. Const. Tom Dube of North Halton O.P.P. investigated both accidents.

# County Endorses Tri-County Study On Milton, Oakville, Burlington

Halton County Council has endorsed a planning study of the inter-relationships of the towns of Milton, Oakville and Burlington... a study that could eventually lead to the formation of Halton as a single municipality.

County councillors Tuesday approved the south Halton study, to be conducted by members of the three towns' planning staffs. The study is expected to deal with the possibilities of merging the three municipalities' services, such as water, sewers and arterial roads.

**"Be Aggressive"**  
"The county should be aggressive in its stand to prevent encroachment from municipalities in the east and the west," warned Burlington Reeve F. I. Rockman. "We have got to be a force to be reckoned with if Toronto and Hamilton have any designs on the county," he said. "We should let it be known we plan to stay intact."
