 Assessment increased by over five per cent last year and the current figure stands at \$15,595,761.

Georgetown Census Finds 10,692 People
 A continuing increase in Georgetown's population finds the town with 10,692 residents, according to figures compiled by the assessment department.

The town has increased by 367 since last September and is almost three times as large as in 1953 when population was registered as 3,774. The biggest yearly increase was in 1958 when Georgetown welcomed 1,700 new residents.
