Saturday is Moving Day

Shift Staffs to New County Courthouse

This coming Saturday is official "moving day" for the Halton County administration. Justice and registry office staffs. The entire staff and office contents of the registry office and over a dozen offices within the present Court House on Brown St., Milton, will be shifted — right down to the last calendar, paper clip and waste basket — to the spanking new, shiny court house on the Base Line.

The move has many "firsts". Notable among the firsts is the fact it will be the first time since the county was founded 100 years ago, that the county administration will not be located in Milton.

The new \$1,125,000 court house is located on the north side of the Oakville-Essex Base Line within the township of Essex. The town of Milton has designs on the property, and it may be annexed back into Milton, the county town, before too long.

Though Saturday is official moving day for the staff, it will really be the climax of a move that has been in the planning stages for many months. This past two weeks many of the old county records have been loaded on trucks and moved to their new home, and Saturday is really the clean-up day when current records and filing cabinets will be transported from one building to the other.

Use County Men
Saturday's move is scheduled to start at 8 a.m., with Tippet-Richardson, a bonded moving firm in charge of the valuable Registry Office furniture and deeds, and 12 county roads department employees and trucks looking after the rest, said clerk administrator Garfield Brown.

The move has been well planned under the supervision of the county clerk-administrator. He's been meeting regularly with other county department heads to iron out little problems and help the staffs get settled down in the new building.

After Saturday's grand moving day, it will be "business as usual". One significant change will see all county departments listed under the one telephone number TR 82801. This means all telephone calls will come into the main switchboard in the new building. From there they will be channeled out to administration, registry office and court offices within the building, and the county garage, Halton Manor, Health Unit, jail, Children's Aid Society and Emergency Measures Organization located in other parts of Milton. The switchboard system has 16 lines, plus several interior lines within the court house.

Clamor for Space
With many present county offices cramped or outdated, there will be a big shift outside the new building after it opens. The Juvenile and Family Court hearings will move from the C.A.S. building on Brown St. to the main court room in the old court house. Magistrate's Court will also be held there.

The jail, which occupies a corner of the present old stone court house, will be expanded to take up the county court clerk's and

sheriff's offices. The Children's Aid hopes to move into the Health Unit building, while the Health Unit wants to take over the vacant Registry Office. Emergency Measures Organization, presently in rented quarters on Main St., and the Oakville and Burlington probation officers' quarters, may eventually move into the present court house building.

Hire Operator
A former Bell Telephone operator Mrs. Norma McKeicher of Campbellville has been engaged as information desk and switchboard operator, with an office in the centre of the new building. Lloyd Young of Campbellville is building superintendent, working steady days, while William Tipping of Milton and a clerk, sheriff, treasurer, engineer, third man yet to be named will be his assistants, alternating every two weeks between 412 and 128 shifts. Two women have also been hired as housekeepers.

In the new building, the registry office, phone control, staff room and boiler rooms will occupy the first floor. The second floor is set aside for administration, with the council chambers, council board chambers, council chambers, law library and lawyers' lounge.

A brick and cement-pavement will soon arrive to carry the name of the building, and a flagpole crown attorney, county court
