Three Injured In Copter Crash

A Weston helicopter pilot, 38 year-old Andrew Hudson and two passengers, William White, 33 vice-president and general manager of Federal Equipment of Canada and Louis Vetesse, 36 owner of Louis Transport, both from Woodbridge, narrowly excaped serious injuries Friday morning when the helicopter they were in crash-landed during a blinding snowstorm, two and a half miles west of Acton. The three men were taken to Guelph General hospital for treatment and later released.

The helicopter, owned by Federal Equipment of Canada, took off from Toronto around 9 a.m. and was reported by one Acton resident as flying quite low when It passed over his home, during Friday's heavy snowstorm. I was on a flight to Kitchener.

The \$75,000 copter crash-landed from a height of about five feet in a foot of snow in a field on the farm of Herbert Brown, R.R. . Acton. Both pontoons were de flated, a section of the main prop broken and the plexiglass cover ing smashed to pieces.

First indication of the crash came when one of the passengers. believed to be Mr. White, made his way through the knee-deep snow to the highway and hitched a ride about one-quarter mile to the garage-general store operated by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Lock, at Crewson's Corners. When the bruised and shaken passenger informed Mr. Lock of the accident, the storeowner immediately called North Halton O.P.P. detach-


