During this week and next week there will be interruptions in hydro power service at the hydro station on Valley Road, off Main St. to allow for the change-over to a higher voltage. The change in voltage will be from 2400 volts to 8000 volts. Considerable work has been done in preparation for the hydro station, such as enlarging the steel framework to accommodate a larger bank of transformers to give increased power for Rockwood and community.
