Dr. Harley Questions Government on Polio

Halton's new Liberal M.P., Dr. Harry Harley of Oakville, broached a three-part inquiry to the Department of National Health and Welfare last week concerning polio cases in Canada during 1962. His questions were:

1. Up to date in 1962, how many cases of poliomyelitis were reported in Canada?

2. In these cases, how many (a) had received no prophylactic measures (b) had received Salk vaccine (c) had received Sabin vaccine?

3. In those cases of polio myelitis reported after receiving Sabin vaccine (a) what was the time interval between immunization and the onset of symptoms of the disease (b) were these cases considered severe, with paralysis, either temporary or permanent?

Minister's Reply

J. Waldo Monteith, Minister of National Health and Welfare, issued the following reply:

1. In 1962 to October 6th, 65 cases of paralytic poliomyelitis have been reported in Canada. This compares to 158 cases and 807 cases for the same period in the years 1961 and 1960 respectively.

2. At the present time, the immunization status is known for only 45 cases. Thirty-one had received no Salk vaccine and of these three had received Sabin vaccine. Six had received one or two doses of Salk vaccine and of these one had received Sabin vaccine. Eight had received three or more doses of Salk vaccine and of these none had received Sabin vaccine.

3. In those cases of polio myelitis reported after receiving Sabin vaccine (a) what was the time interval between immunization and the onset of symptoms of the disease (b) were these cases considered severe, with paralysis, either temporary or permanent?

4. The time interval between receiving Sabin vaccine and occurrence of symptoms varied from 17 to 48 days. (b) Two cases had severe permanent paralysis and two cases had moderate paralysis which at last examination were showing much improvement.

5. In 1962, 24 hours a day with police emergency call facilities.

Sgt. C. Wilkinson, who is in charge of the 28-man North Halton OPP detachment, said a new Campbellville 7-Eleven number was put into operation this week. If residents have emergency calls and cannot reach police at the TR-8207 number in Milton, they can call the operator and ask for ZE-5000 and be connected directly with the Oakville detachment.

No Action Phone

Milton and Georgetown telephone subscribers have similar 7-Eleven numbers that connect with Burlington and Oakville.

Police

Police are manned constantly between 8 a.m. and midnight at the Milton OPP detachment; however from midnight to 8 a.m. there is not always an officer stationed in the office as they must be out on car patrols.
