Six Generations

His wife was the former Ella Johnston of Malton, and they were married at her home October 23, 1912, by Mr. Kitching's two brothers, Rev. George Kitching and Rev. John Leslie Kitching. Another special guest was Mrs. Cook (nee Lena Moffat) of Corinna, Michigan, who was a bridesmaid at the ceremony 50 years ago.
