

Additional Two-Rooms Planned for No. 2 Eramosa

A two-room addition to No. 2 School has been approved by the Eramosa School Board. At a special meeting on October 30, the decision passed with one dissenting vote. The addition will accommodate increased enrollment and continue the plan of closing one-room schools.

Two architects were interviewed and John F. A. Haeyer of Guelph was engaged.

At the meeting on October 18, two parents interviewed the board, requesting that their children be permitted the use of the school bus. The request was not granted, due to the present policy of the board.

Inspector's reports on new teachers were received. No action was taken on the purchase of a duplicator. Prices were requested for drapes or venetian blinds for the Junior Room at No. 11.

The board set a fee of \$12.50 per month for non-resident pupils including wards of the Children's Aid Society.

In regard to reference books, the teachers have again been requested to study various types of books published by different companies.

Prices were requested for a movie projector for No. 9 school. The board registered with the Western Ontario Trustees' Convention to be held at Guelph on November 7.

The resignation of Mrs. Grimshaw as janitor at No. 7 school was accepted and Mrs. Alice Klooster was engaged.

Christmas treats were again authorized for each pupil and pre-school child. The board discussed various matters resulting from the meeting of the chairman and secretary with the township council.

Present were chairman William Hindley, trustees Warren Parkinson, Ben Hosking, William Jackson and Dr. R. J. Hilton and inspector C. R. Whitfield.

Display Planned By Night School

Arrangements for the annual display night of the night school classes were made at a committee meeting in the high school Monday evening. Classes will be over on Tuesday and Wednesday, November 20 and 21, and display night is set for Saturday evening, December 1. Committees were formed to plan the event.

Displays will include one by the Basic English class. There are now two Basic English classes, one taught by Mrs. Rogers and one by Oscar Driber. The second was started recently to accommodate six Yugoslavs come to work at the quarry, who speak no English whatsoever.

New courses will be on display to encourage registration for other crafts. There will also be some demonstrations including the popular fashion show.

There has been a registration of 156 in 14 classes.

The instructor badly in need of repair at the school had been finally fixed. He also reported that no parking signs for unauthorized personnel had arrived but standards had not been delivered.

Transportation committee chairman Mollat commended the bus drivers for not attempting to buck deep snow during the sudden storm Friday, October 26 when roads in the rural area had been treacherous. He noted that in another area one school bus landed in the ditch and another turned crosswise on the road.

Forecast Budget

Following a request from council to prepare an estimated five-year capital expenditure report, members forecast an estimated capital expenditure of \$100,000 for 1963-64 and the same for 1965-66.

Board members discussed a future increase in population at public school level and agreed it might be necessary to vacate the stone school at the end of next year in the event the public school required the building.

They learned from the secretary the public school board is going to review the problem.

Board members also approved a Bell Telephone installation to hook up the PA system at the main high school with that in the stone school.

Approved a contract for main tenance on equipment with the IBM Company.

Approved accounts for payment totalling \$18,855.70.

Poppy day in Acton is being held Friday and Saturday, November 9 and 10, and is sponsored by the Acton Legion under the direction of chairman Hamilton Peal. The Legion Ladies Auxiliary will conduct a door-to-door canvass and canvass industry Friday. Legionnaires will be on the streets Saturday selling poppies. School children will receive poppies free.

A Remembrance Day window will be set up again at Acton Home Furnishings store under the direction of E. E. Barr and William Middleton, who handle the yearly chore.

Brief Service

On Sunday the Remembrance Day service will be held but due to regular church services, the order of service will be shortened with only a brief service being held at the cenotaph. Each church will conduct its regular Sunday morning service.

The veterans will parade to Knox Presbyterian church after the cenotaph service.

The parade will form up at the Legion Hall at 10:30 a.m. Acton Citizens' Band and Acton Pipe Band will both march to the cenotaph for the 10:45 service. Legion president James Milne will give the Legion charge after which individual wreaths will be placed on the cenotaph in honor of the dead. Names of veterans killed in wars will be read by Max Sturey after which the Last Post and Reveille will be sounded by Frank Simons. Following the singing of "Abide With Me" the benediction will be given by Legion Padre Rev. A. H. McKenzie.
