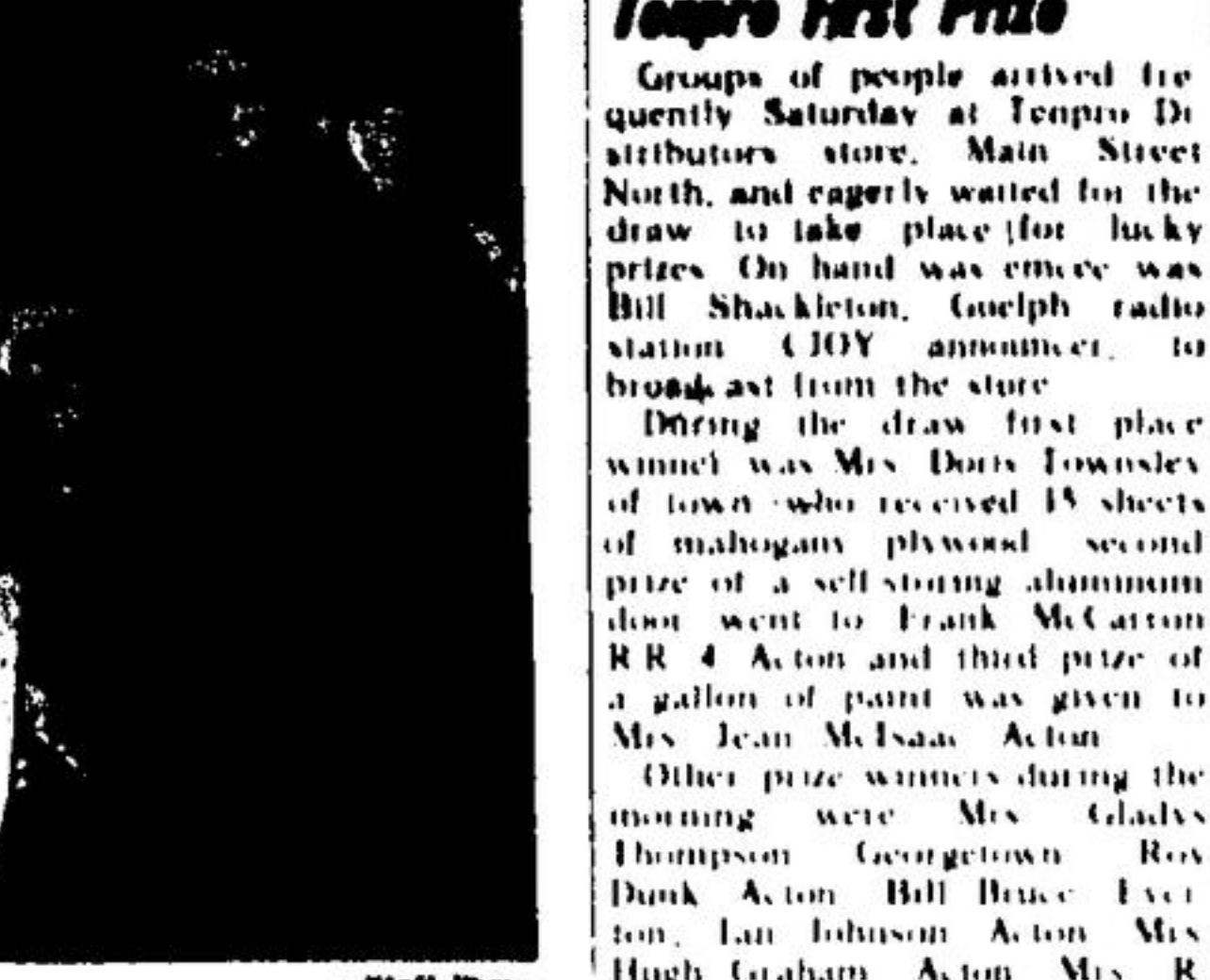
The Y's Menettes are serving tables and dressing with vegetable pie, milk and coffee. About 100 are expected.

Roof Leak Stopped

Members discussed the problem of school roofs leaking and leached leaks at both schools had been stopped but wondered about a guarantee on the bonded roof. The secretary was instructed to contact the architect regarding the strength of the supports before a deflection ranging from one to one and a half inches was repaired on the roof.

Both principals reported that books for the school approved by the Department of Education had been purchased recently. They also reported several trees had been planted at each school and more would be planted in the spring.

Following a request from town council to submit a five-year capital budget estimate, members forecast a yearly budget of \$5,000 for capital expenditures providing no new building program was necessary.

Accounts totaling \$5,933.33 were approved for payment.
