

## National President Speaker At Halton Fame Annual Meet

The second annual meeting of the Halton County Fame organization was held on Wednesday, October 23rd, at St. Stephen's Church, Hornby. Charles McInnis, national president of Fame, addressed the gathering of over 80 following a fine turkey supper prepared by the ladies of St. Stephen's Guild.

"Fame", standing for Farmers Allied Meat Enterprises is an organization trying to build meat processing plants, where farmers can process their own meat. These plants will be owned by the farmers who buy shares from the organization at \$100 a share.

Archie Service, a provincial director and a county committee member for Halton, introduced Mr. McInnis, saying "we owe him a debt of gratitude which we will never be able to pay. He has dedicated his life to the farm community and has helped the farmers put a price tag on the products they produce."

Mr. McInnis opened his speech by congratulating the Halton Fame organization for being the top county for raising funds for Fame during the past year, on a percentage basis. The 22 members of the Halton organization raised \$22,700.

### Report from Ottawa

## Gov't Deals With Drugs

Since our last column, the resolution on the Food and Drug Act has passed in resolution form and in the near future will be presented in Bill form. We have already discussed this in some detail.

On Friday, October 26, the debate on the amendments to the Food and Drug Act was started. This deals mainly with placing new drugs on the market and more restricted sampling. This bill was introduced by the Minister of National Health and Welfare. Amendments were obviously precipitated by the thalidomide tragedies.

**First to Speak**  
It was my honor to be the first Liberal speaker on this bill. I will summarize my speech at this point, as I think the problem is one that interests everyone.

The schedule of the thalidomide tragedies was reviewed. The drug was produced in Germany in 1953 and placed on the market there in 1957. After review by the Food and Drug Directorate, it was placed on the Canadian market by two drug firms in April, 1961.

In November, 1961, the question of side effects of the drug began to be noticed. In December, 1961, warning letters were sent to all doctors by the Food and Drug Directorate. Further reports of abnormalities were forthcoming and the drug was removed from the market in March, 1962. The drug was withdrawn in Germany in November, 1961, and in England, December, 1961.

**Long Delay**  
The three month delay in removing the drug from the market is the area where the government's responsibility must lie. It is unfortunate that our communications were not better in this case, as three months elapsed between removal in Germany and Canada.

We must strengthen legislation so that drugs must be removed quickly from the market when harmful. The jequirity bean necklaces also show that more than drugs can be harmful, as these necklaces are potentially dangerous.

Future debate on the above has been discontinued and the budget resolutions are again before the House of Commons.

The following recommendations were made:  
(1) In view of the professional background necessary to understand the problem, referral to a special House of Commons Committee was proposed;  
(2) more staff and a larger budget for the overworked Food and Drug Directorate;  
(3) suggested placing a representative of the Food and Drug Directorate in each drug firm, doing experimental work as an observer only.

**Keep for Experiment**  
Potentially dangerous but worthwhile drugs are to be available for experimental purposes.

The suggestions as above could cost a great deal of money. However, I do not feel that Canadians would think the necessary money would be mispent in order to ensure that future generations of Canadians be of sound body and mind.

At Francis, agricultural representative and George Atkins, Farm commentator for the C.B.C. were also present at the meeting.

At the Times they showed his photos of his trip to Moscow this past summer where he was a delegate to compare treatment, research and services in Russia. Mr. McInnis' description of the Russian visit was very vivid.

**Questions Clarified**  
Following this luncheon the Ontario chairman in charge of each service gave a report of her service and added new suggestions. Colorful displays helped give many attractive suggestions to the gift committee. Many questions regarding dressings and transportation were clarified. Supplementary services were discussed and responsibilities for each service were definitely differentiated one from another.

The program of the evening consisted of a delightful dinner at which Dr. R. M. Taylor brought a message of the history of the National Cancer Institute. Dr. W. G. Cobble, who is medical director of the Canadian Treatment and Research Foundation, explained the service of the Foundation. As chairman of the Canadian Medical Association Dr. A. D. Kelly followed with a message from his Association and commended the Canadian Cancer Society, on how closely and well the Association (which included the Women's Services) has cooperated with each of the Cancer Organizations.

Wednesday began with a special "make-up" by Richard Hudnut for the ladies following which many new services were discussed and previous services reviewed.

**One Family**  
The delegates to the conference were privileged to hear a guest speaker at the Wednesday luncheon a message from the Very Reverend John F. Donovan, M.M., Vicar General of Maryknoll Fathers, Maryknoll, New York. Father Donovan was given a standing ovation by the delegates at the conclusion of his message. His topic was the Chinese quotation "All under Heaven, one family." Father Donovan spent many years in China.

After luncheon all delegates packed out of the hotel and were then transported by bus to Queen's Park. In the Lieutenant Governor's Suite, Lieutenant Governor and Mrs. Keiller Mackay received the delegates to Women's Services Committee Conference.
