

In November, 1961, the question of side effects of the drug began to be noticed. In December, 1961, warning letters were sent to all doctors by the Food and Drug Directorate. Further reports of abnormalities were forthcoming and the drug was removed from the market in March, 1962. The drug was withdrawn in Germany in November, 1961, and in England, December, 1961.

Long Delay The three month delay in removing the drug from the market is the area where the government's responsibility must lie. t is unfortunate that our communications were not better in this case, as three months ofapsed between removal in Ger-

many and Canada. We must strengthen legislation so that drugs must be removed quickly from the market when harmful. The jequirity bean neck-(The United Church of Canada) laces also show that more than drugs can be harmful, as these necklaces are potentially danger-


