turned the proceeds from their caroling party to the school. "We who are connected with the school think every organization that made this school possible."

He praised the untiring efforts of the late Mrs. Katy Ellenton, a past president of the Association who died while the school was in construction. He noted three others who had devoted much time and effort for the association, but passed away without seeing the school opened for use — the late M.P.P. Stanley L. Hall, Warden Wilfrid Bird, and Milton Reeve, Mrs. Mary S. Pettit.

Brian Halliday, vice president of the Ontario Association for Retarded Children, described the school as "one of the most thoughtful schools for retarded children that I have seen." He reminded the gathering however, that "working with retarded children is like mountain climbing, when you reach a goal such as this building, you must look around and see the other challenges that are yet to be conquered." He suggested that work be continued towards the setting up of classes for pre-school children and adult workshops.

Mr. Addison presented Mrs. Helen Howard of Milton with a life membership in the North Halton Association for Retarded Children. Mrs. Howard was on the first committee, when the Sunshine school was begun in 1955, and has been active on the executive and as a parent ever since.

Unique Place  
Harold Henry, chairman of the program, described the school as a "unique school and a well equipped institution."

Architect J. M. Martin presented the keys of the building contractor Fred Zorge, who in turn gave them to Mrs. R. P. E. Jeffares, principal of the school. Mrs. Jeffares then turned the keys over to Gerry Addison. In giving Mr. Addison the keys, she commented that "without his help this school would never have become a reality."

Depict "Grace"  
Twenty slides, depicting a "Retarded Child's Grace," were shown during the program. The chairman, Mr. Henry also introduced Judge George E. Elliot, Dr. Harry Harley, Halton M.P., and Bill Kirk, executive director of the Ontario Association of Retarded Children.

Following the program, refreshments were served.

Open house and tours of the school followed the opening and the school was open to the parents again on Sunday.

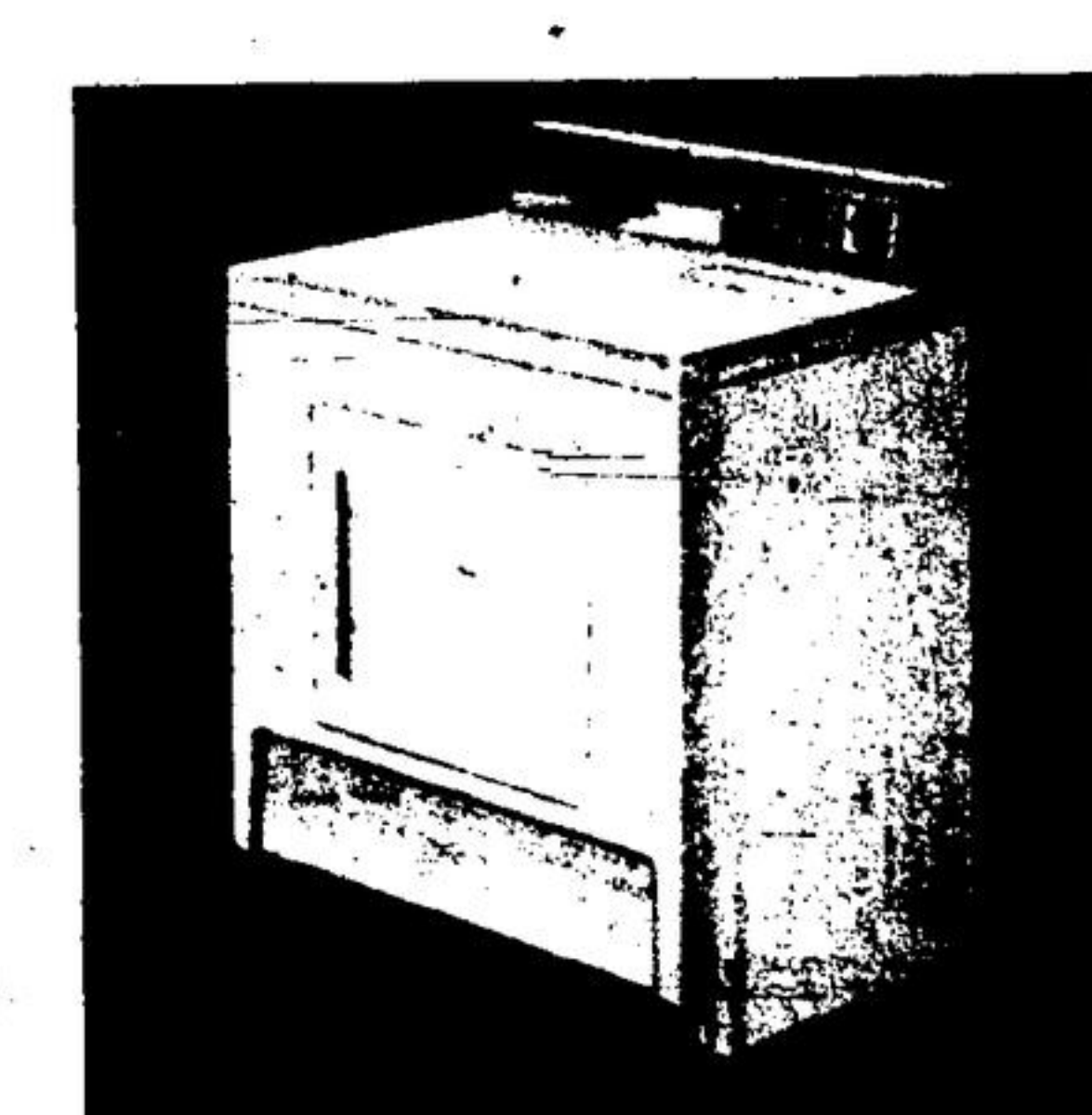
