line brigade: Paul Lawson, Peter Lawson, John Cunningham and Herb Jobb. New faces are Max Stafford, one of the best prospects and Red Barber, Fred Kerner and "Basher" Ben Bayliss, a Tanner from "way back."

Up front there's been quite a few players looking for a berth including returnees from last year's team. Bud Haines, Emerson Baxter, Stu Macdonald, Ted Fogitt, Harold Townsley and Phil (Scotty) McCristall. Two of last year's juveniles who played with the Tanners last season for three games, Ron Mellon and Ron Malcolm are also trying out.

New faces up front are recreation director Jim Casburn, Howie Leader, Don Aubin (with Fin last year) and G. Love who played with Acton Rocks at the O.R.A.A. level.

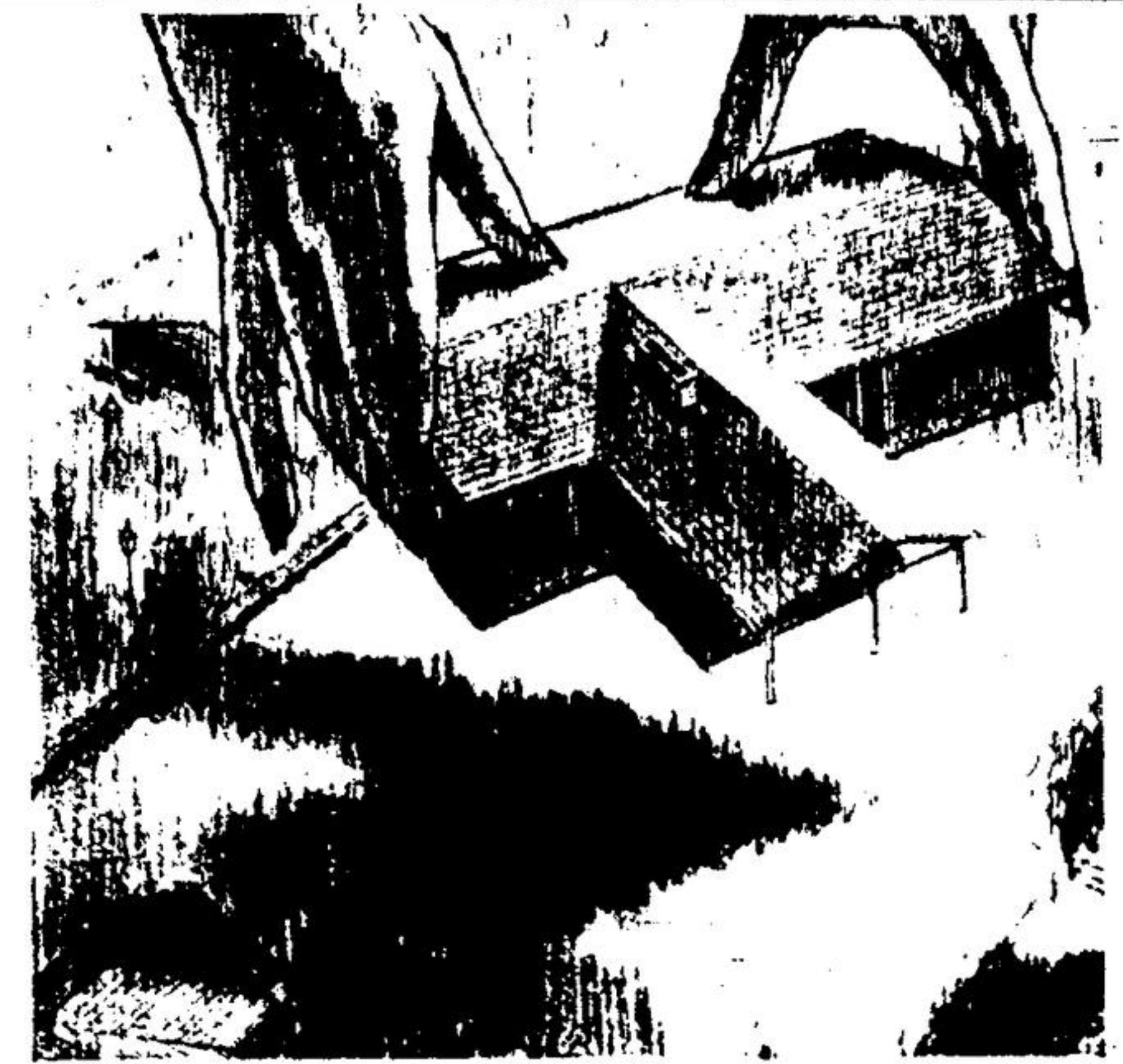
