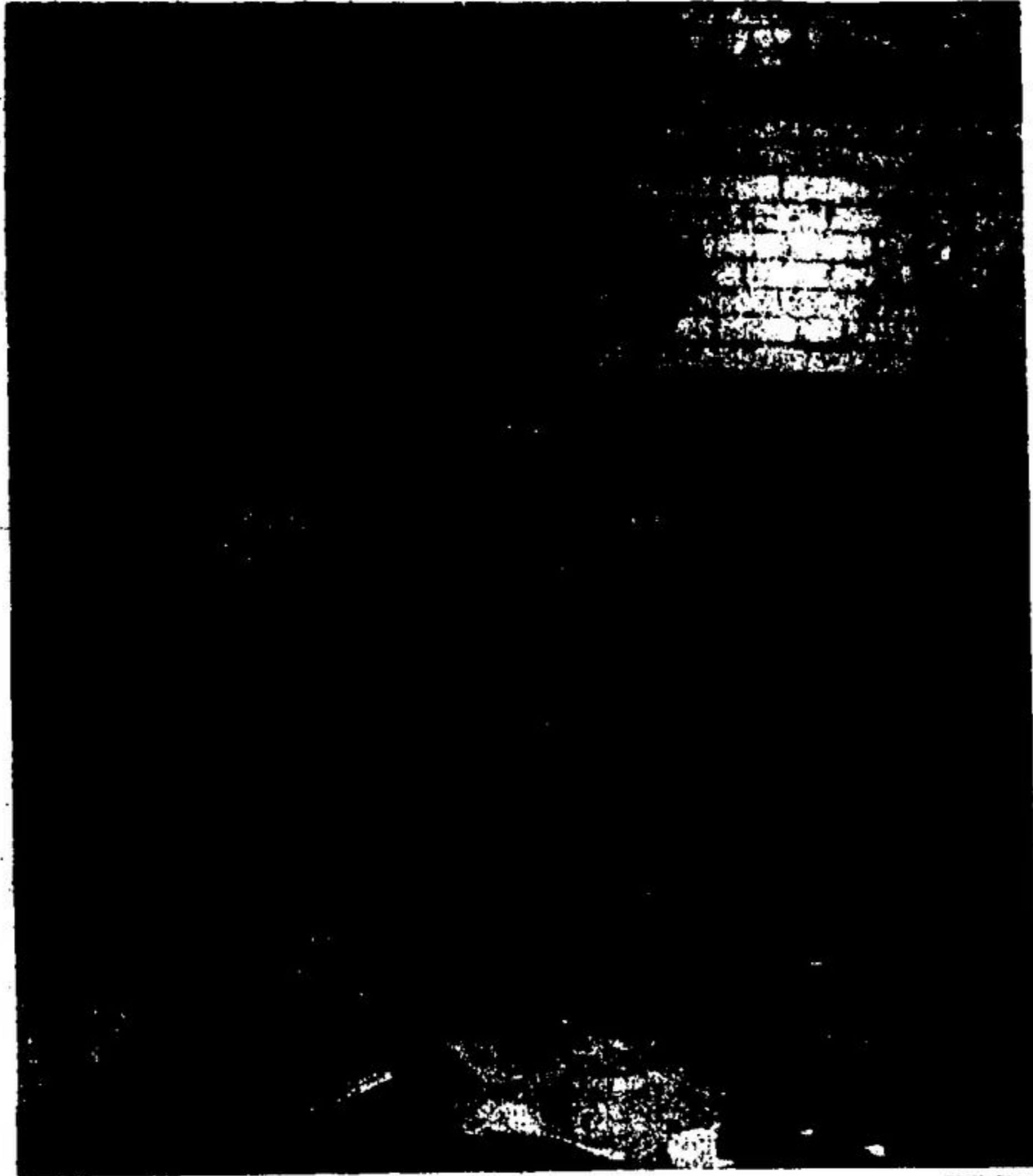
Directed by Ruth and George Muselle, the cast of close to 50 has been practicing weekly and lately twice weekly in order to have the show ready for opening night.
