

# Gordon Beatty Heads Halton PCs 120 at Riviera Hear Guest M.P.P.

Filling an office his father had, Gordon Beatty of Action was unanimously and speedily elected president of the Halton County Conservative Association last Thursday. W. J. Beatty, now Beardmore president, held the post for several years in the mid-40s.

The annual meeting of the association brought 120 to the Riviera for the year's business (including repeated warnings of a difficult year ahead), a dinner and dance. Most were from the north of the county and the representation was less than expected.

Most of the other officers were returned — John Depew, O.C. as first vice-president, Mrs. Barbara Cooper as lady vice-president, Alton (Bud) Nichols as secretary and George Kerr as treasurer. Andy Frymyer of Burlington is the new Young Progressive Conservatives representative. Ken Allen of Burlington is a new auditor with Mac Sprawl of Esquimes.

**Speeches, Dancing**  
Hot ham dinner was served to members at small tables around the walls of the attractive new night spot, with the head table on the dance floor, a few steps lower. After the business and addresses by former member of parliament Sandy Best, the new president, and a talk by pinch-hitting guest speaker M.P.P. Wallace Downer, there was dancing to the Debonnaires' orchestra.

Past president Peter Tulley turned the agenda over to Mr. Beatty after the elections, conducted by past president Les Clarke of Georgetown. Secretary Bud Nichols reported on nine meetings of the county executive.

**Go to Ottawa**  
The annual meeting of the Conservative associations will be in Ottawa, January 17 to 19; delegates named were Mr. Beatty and Mrs. Cooper, with alternates Mr. Tulley and William Card of Oakville.

Past president Les Clarke warned, "This will not be an ordinary year. Be prepared to do a lot of work. You'll find almost certainly two elections, perhaps three."

**Sandy Looks Ahead**  
"This will be a difficult year," declared Mr. Best, when he spoke. Congratulating Mr. Beatty, he added, "But it can be a strong and successful year with you at the helm. You will have the help of a large and vigorous association." He predicted success at

federal and provincial polls within the next six months.

He approved the trend to dinner meetings and said although there might have been more present, he recalled half that many at annual meetings in Milton town hall. The 500 attendance at the nomination meeting he felt was a "dramatic tribute" to the party.

"This meeting is not complete without Stan Hall," he said. "He represented much of what was best in rural Ontario."

Any estimate of when an election will be just a "guess." The committee is preparing for work at 300-odd polls.

**Don't Stoop**  
"I hope the next federal campaign is a good, clean, hard fought affair. We must fight as hard as we can, but we will not stoop to methods used by the other parties. . . I beg that you, this is not our nature or tradition."

**Just Temporary**  
Mr. Best said he was delighted when a letter from the mayor of Burlington, sent to him in Ottawa as M.P., was sent back to Georgetown marked "temporarily absent."

He concluded by introducing the guest speaker, the Rev. A. Wallace Downer, M.P.P. for Dufferin-Simcoe, who was elected to parliament in 1937 and has been there continuously since.

**Phil Stan Hall's Shoes**  
Mr. Downer began by saving Mr. Best had been a good member.

**Rev. S. Thoman New Minister**  
Rev. S. Thoman of Petrolia, Thursday accepted the call of the congregation of the Acton Pentecostal Tabernacle and will begin as the pastor the first Sunday in the New Year.
