## Where to Vote

Acton voters Tuesday will vote at the following polling stations:

Ward 1, polling subdivision one: Acton United Church, comprising all the part of town east of John Street and south of Mill Street to Queen Street east.

Ward 1, polling subdivision two: Y.M.C.A., voters living east of Young Street and South of Queen Street east.

Ward 2, council chambers: voters living north of Mill Street and east of John Street.

Ward 3, Luxton Memorial Hall: voters living west of John Street and north of Mill Street.

Ward 4, Y.M.C.A.: voters living south of Mill Street and west of John Street.

Hours for voting are from 10 a.m. Tuesday morning until 7:30 in the evening.

## Election Results

Complete election results will be available next Tuesday evening from the Acton Free Press office. Latest Acton returns will be given and completed returns from Nassagaweya and Esquesing, where elections are on Monday.

Members of the Free Press staff will be on hand during the evening. Two telephone lines will be open to give callers the results of the election as they are received.

# 18 Candidates Seeking 11 Seats As Voters Go to Polls Tuesday

This year voters will mark their ballots to elect a new mayor, a reeve, six councillors and three public school board members. During the annual nominations Thursday, November 22, the office of deputy-reeve as filled by acclamation by incumbent William Denny and two positions on Acton Hydro Electric Commission by incumbents Gordon Beaty and Ted Tyler Sr.

Contesting the office of mayor are former councillor George V. Barbeau and Edward MacDonald.

GEORGE V. BARBEAU, plant manager at the A. P. Green Fire Brick company, lives with his wife and two children at 298 Arthur St. He has been in Acton 12 years. He has been six years on council, is past president of the Chamber of Commerce, is a member of the Canadian Ceramic Society and Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen. "If elected I will attempt to administer the town's business to the best of my ability," he says.

EDWARD MACDONALD, 39 Mosbray Place, married with one child, is self-employed in "consulting engineering." He is a veteran of World War II, member of Acton Chamber of Commerce and Lions Club. He made a previous unsuccessful attempt for council and this is his first attempt for the position of mayor. Mr. MacDonald said "Being self-employed is a necessity for a mayor in order to be able to devote sufficient time to the town. He also believes the firefighters are underpaid" and stated, "If elected, I am willing to forego to all I ask every eligible person to turn out at the polls and vote for the first time in four years in Acton for mayor."

He is not in favor of purchase of the old post office and if additional space is necessary, suggests erecting a new municipal office. In either event he urges a public vote on the question. "If I am elected, I promise the people a mayor who will give leadership to all I ask every eligible person to turn out at the polls and vote for the first time in four years in Acton for mayor."

Esquesing township voters will go to the polls Monday and mark ballots for three councillors and three school board trustees Monday evening during nominations. Reeve George Leslie and Deputy Reeve Wilfrid Leslie were returned to office by acclamation.

Before reports were heard during the public meeting, the large crowd stood in silence for one minute in memory of three well known township officials who died recently, former reeve and county warden Wilfrid Bird, road superintendent W. E. Townsend and school board secretary Lorne Balkin.

Proposed Candidates

Candidates running for council include George Currie, Robert Lawson, Walter Linham, all former members, and a newcomer, Mervin Barber. Running for two positions on school board are present members Mrs. Shirley Armstrong and Stanley Brown and newcomer in the race Harry Herensberger.

All candidates, with the exception of the two newcomers, acknowledged their intention to run for office. Mr. Bird and Mr. Herensberger qualified the following day.

## Opening Ceremonies At Limehouse School

The staff will be introduced and the school choir will sing. Refreshments will be served by the Women's Institutes of Baxtonburgh, Limehouse and Ballinafad.

## Approve Preparation Closing By-Law Mayor, Two Councillors Opposed

Preparation of a Municipal by-law to govern the closing hours of retail businesses in Acton was authorized at Tuesday's council meeting. Under a vote which was passed by a majority of council, in a rare voting split by council members, the by-law will be prepared and presented to council for passing. Voting in favor of the motion were Reeve Hargrave, Deputy Reeve Denny and Councillors Wood, Barbeau and Tom Opposed were Mayor Goy and Councillors Doby and Peal.

Petitions signed by the majority of businessmen, divided into seven classifications, had been presented to council a week ago. At this week's meeting a delegation of 15 merchants was present to discuss with council a committee of the whole, any points on which council might need clarification.

Spokesman for the merchants in support of the petition was Paul Nielsen. One dissenter was Vito Cipolletti, a new barber in the Acton Shopping Centre.

Petition Presented

A petition was read and requested the enactment of a by-law embracing the present store closing hours now in effect under a Gentlemen's Agreement. Basically, the by-law would have stores closed all day Monday open Tuesday Wednesday Thursday and Saturday until 9 p.m. and open Friday until 9 p.m. In addition in the by-law a few exceptions for weeks in which there are statutory holidays and for the two week period before Christmas.

Businesses represented at the meeting were Paul Nielsen, Wear, Edna Mae Ladies Wear, A.B. Supermarket, Newtons 5c to 10c, Holloway Barber Shop, Sun Hardware, Ledgers E.G.A., Vito's Barber Shop, Bens in Shoes, Gordon's Hardware, Esquesing Men's Shop and Hummick's Barber Shop.

Solicitor Aldo Branda was present to discuss with council his visit to the Public Trustee regarding the town's position in the Y.M.C.A. Various suggestions were made in exploring solutions to the present and future status of the building.

The Public Trustee had suggested that if a satisfactory conclusion cannot be reached for all parties concerned, it would be wise to go to the courts for clarification of the terms of the will and the building's future. The solicitor was instructed to visit the Public Trustee again before a meeting is requested with the Y.M.C.A. Board of Directors.

Appointments were made to the new Recreation Commission. Appointed were Mrs. Bert Keates, Mrs. Helen Otterbein, Donny Widdis, Len Lovell, Claude Cook, Mayor John Goy and Councillor George Barbeau.

The mayor recommended that early in 1963 council amend the by-law to increase the size of the board from seven members to 12. He reported the board would be dividing into similar sub-committees to plan a year-round program.

Police protection will cost \$5500 more in 1963 than was anticipated. Notice was received from the O.P.P. that an additional amount of \$1000 will be required next year. This will bring the Acton detachment to one sergeant and four constables.

Total cost in 1963 will be \$4025. Last year an extra constable was being during the holiday period for four months. This part time help will not be needed this year with the addition of constable Peter who will be on five and a half day week with one day required to live away during the year.

## Mistook C.N.R. Train For Approaching Car

Two Peterborough men, 22-year-old Richard Allan Godfrey and 22-year-old George Beaumont escaped injury Monday evening when the 1954 Ford in which they were riding veered out of control, travelled for 250 feet off the highway, crashing through a snow fence, striking a telephone pole and spinning into the lawn at the home of Phil LaSueur, Main Street, North.

The driver, Richard Godfrey, told police he was approaching the corner of No. 7 Highway and Main Street North when seeing the light of a westbound train he believed it was coming to ward him on the road, and swerved to miss it, lost control of the car.

Both men were on their way home to Peterborough from a visit in Guelph at the time of the accident around 7 p.m. Constable Ron Rupert investigated. The driver was charged with careless driving and the owner and passenger with failing to change the ownership. Damage was estimated at \$400 to the car.

## Holstein Cow Dies Vet Fears Rabies

A Holstein cow believed suffering from rabies died at the farm of Hank Dunken on the third line at Esquesing on Monday.

Dr. F. G. Oakes reported the diagnosis of rabies was being checked and had not yet definitely been confirmed. A section of brain from the animal has been forwarded to the Dominion Laboratory at Hull and a report is expected back shortly. Eye news: been more certain of a rabies diagnosis. Dr. Oakes explained noting the cow had been ill for several days and had died on Monday night.

If the rabies diagnosis is confirmed it would be the first case of rabies this year involving a farm animal.
