Tanners Edged in League Opener

Slippery Paul Knox, awarded a seldom seen penalty shot in the dying minutes of the third period, parked it behind Acton net-minder Jack Marshall and it proved to be the winning goal in a knock down and drag-out intermediate hockey opener that had about 600 fans on the edge of their seats, here, Friday night.

Knox, along with Bob Dobbie, was the big gun as Fergus Flyers edged Acton Tanners 8-7 in a contest which at times bordered on playoff style hockey.

Final Bell Decides

In contrast to last year's opening game in Fergus when the same two teams met, Friday's opener was not decided until the final bell. Fergus was lucky to

pull out of town wearing the winners' mantle — and they knew it.

Outside of the first period when they showed more polish around the net and outscored the new edition of the Tanners 4-2, Flyers were on the defensive much of the time. Nineteen penalties assessed by referees Barney Reid and Don Simpson — 10 of them to the Tanners — blemished the contest, the earliest opener ever in Acton.

Fans went home muttering under their breath at the penalty shot officials awarded the Fergus club when Max Stafford smothered a loose puck in front of the Acton net by falling on it. Since it was in the crease and

That put Fergus ahead 8-6 with only a few minutes left to play. Then Phil (Scotty) McCristall deflected one past Prickett at 15:15 to bring the Tanners to within one goal. Despite repeated assaults at the Fergus net they couldn't notch the equalizer.

It was this kind of frustration that put the Flyers ahead early in the game with Bob Dobbie pulling the string on the first two Fergus goals. He deked the Tanners right out of their pants and backhanded pucks past Jack Marshall, the first one with two Tanners in the sin bin.

Harold Townsley, playing a strong game, finally twanged the twine for the Tanners after repeated sorties at the Fergus net. They nearly tied it in the next few minutes but penalties cooled the Acton club out and with Knox left uncovered in front of the net, Dobbie's relay made it 8-7.

Stafford Shines

The Tanners roared back and Max Stafford, a new face and a standout for Acton, let fly a slap shot from inside the blue line that gave Prickett no chance. That made it 4-2 and the period ended that way.

Flung down left wing, Emerson (Beaver) Baxter put the Tanners to within one goal on a puck that deflected into the Fergus net at the 10:00 mark of the second and Stu McDonald's long shot from the blue line picked the nearest corner and made it even-seven at the 5:11 mark.

Wenzel put the Flyers ahead again only to have Baxter tie it up again at 12:15 on an unassisted effort. But two quick goals from D. Wenzel and Ron Tippett saw Fergus finish the period ahead 7-5.

Emmerson Baxter finished off a hat trick on a play from directly in front of the net to put the Tanners back in the game again early in the third stanza and with the Acton club pressing it looked like they might tie the exhibition tilt at the Community Centre Sunday afternoon.
