Board Severs

(Continued from Page One) Various legislative grants and fees had been received. He cautioned trustees, a very close watch would have to be kept on expenditures for the balance of the year. He estimated a deficit of \$3,300 on the year's operation. The salary of C. Rognvaldson was adjusted because his industrial experience is now being used in his shop work classes. Previously the board had granted salary adjustment to teachers whose experience prior to their teaching career is of value in their present teaching. The board allows \$150 a year for up to seven years' previous experience. Mr. Rognvaldson was allowed credit for four years' experience.

Principal's Report
Principal E. A. Hansen reported the enrollment had increased to 398 students. He also expressed his satisfaction with parent-teacher interviews conducted in the school auditorium November 8 and told members he is planning another interview period for January.

The board was told by Mr. Hansen that government grants are not available for students not attending school in the event buses are unable to travel on rural roads. The enquiry was spurred following the first heavy snowfall when buses could not buck the heavy drifts.

Too Costly
During a previous meeting, the principal suggested installation of a system between the stone school and the main high school to enable a one-way hookup of the public address system. During Monday's meeting members learned the installation of such a system by Peffer Sound System would cost \$470.05. Mr. Hansen said the cost was out of reason and suggested investigating a rental system from the Bell Telephone Company. He was instructed to obtain prices.

No Smoking Area
Board members turned thumbs down on a suggestion to allow a "smoking area" at the school during the student council's Christmas dance, Thursday, December 20. A smoking area had been requested by the students in hopes of preventing strangers from attending the dance.

The secretary, W. Middleton, was instructed to advise the gas company regarding a faulty gas stove in the home economics room. Approval was given for payment amounting to \$27 for caretakers' fees during the nine week period basic English classes were held.

Reviews Year
At the conclusion of the meeting, the last of the year, various members expressed their pleasure and satisfaction in the year's work and progress. Chairman Forre in summing up said, "Our school stands in better shape than since I have been on the school board. I think it is better in every way shape and form. I am pleased with the administration. In future I hope to see more grade 11 graduates. I am going to stay on the board if Council sees fit to reappoint me."

Wallace Swackhamer has been a tower of strength on the property committee. He has never had to call me during the year. I appreciate his fine work. Duran Moffat has done a very conscientious job in transportation. He has brought out solid problems to the board. Mr. Engel has been a decided asset to the board, ever there to go along with the annual report committee and the public relations with the town has shown much improvement. Jack Reid has been a tower of strength on the finance committee and is vice chairman. The principal and vice principal have been very good in reporting and giving strong support to the board. Billy Middleton has been treasurer.

Norman Young, minister of Limehouse Presbyterian church, gave the dedication to open the new school. R. F. Bird, former inspector in this district and now assistant superintendent of elementary education, cut a wide red ribbon to symbolically open the new school.

Vice-chairman of the school board, Mrs. Shirley Armstrong expressed her appreciation for the large turnout. She introduced Ken Cameron, supervising architect of the new school, and E. J. Ward, former inspector of the Board and Revere architect. Mr. Barnett presented a United Nations flag to the school on behalf of his company. General contractor J. O. Lustrac and Sons, Oakville, were congratulated, but had no representative there. Trustee Ma. Sprawl introduced Linda Kirkwood and Sharon Hume, pupils from Spesside Central school who presented an atlas on behalf of their school.

Trustee Stanley Brown introduced school inspector O. G. McDowell who in turn introduced the guest speaker. The school choir led by music supervisor Mrs. Mary Kidney, sweetly sang "Earrest, Earrest, Earrest" and led the audience in singing "O Canada".

At the conclusion of the program refreshments were served by the Women's Institute of Limehouse, Ballinatal and Brockburn. The ladies passed out coffee and fruit bread through the school on trays. Cars rained, but guests were parked along the roads and road.

Harry Arbie arranged to set up an address system so the trustees could be heard in the school. Children with fresh faces and costumes up the uniform, as they were, were seen. I don't know what we will do without him. The inauguration ceremony was set for Monday, December 23.

The post office suggests the following deadline mailing dates for Canada and the USA:

Mail to distant points in Canada and the USA before December 8.

Mail to other out-of-town points in Canada before December 11.

Mail for local delivery before December 17.

1888 Prescriptions In Old Faded Book

Mrs. Earl Cooper has discovered an old book filled with faded prescriptions dating back as far as 1888. It carries through to the 1920s when A. T. Brown was druggist. Many of the drugs prescribed there are still in common use in Cooper's Drug Store today — except perhaps, heroin!

Rhubarb, sassafras, a few tablespoons of wine, camphorated oil, ginger were among the things that soothed early Actonians. The book also contained recipes, one for a minister's hectographing ink, one for hair restorer, another for a thick paste to rub on the neck and another as a cure for cancer. Cough remedies were frequent, just as they are today.

Mrs. Cooper is very interested in old things and has already given articles from Brown's drug store to Halton County museum.
