After the usual refreshments and the usual conversation, the evening came upon us. The carpet was then rolled off the floor, the musician was called and the whole company was invited to dance. (Samuel Johnson, 8th Sept. 1771).

On Wednesday, I gave a ball. How do we think I contrived to stretch out this home complex all-wass dancing? Yet this is true. Our fiddler sat where the cupboard is and they danced in both rooms, the table was stuffed in to the window and we had plenty of room. It made the barns all lastly happy. (Mrs. Alison Cockburn in a letter from Edinburgh 1771).

Such were the occasions on which, in Highlands and Lowlands, the Scottish country dances were danced in the 18th century and so they are still danced.

The Acton Scottish Dance Club will try on Saturday to catch something of the spirit of one of those cheerful evenings. But not in any antiquarian spirit, trying to recapture the past for a dancing the Scottish Country Dances, they are not reviving a tradition but simply carrying on one which has never died and is very much alive today.
