Night School Display Fills High School Gym Principal Explains Early Season "Experiment"

From earrings to big bulky chairs, articles made in the ninth season of night school classes in Acton ringed the high school gym Saturday night. About 200 attend ed the annual Display Night held for the first time before Christ mas in an experiment, the entire season was held before the holi day and the usual show at winter's end was put forward to the first night in December.

The work of 100 students from Acton, Georgetown, Rockwood, Erin and the district was attractively displayed around the room.

100 Paintings
There were nearly 100 can vases from the amateur artists of the two painting classes, the elementary taught by Major H. J. Newman of Ballinacraig and the advanced and sketching class taught by Frank Black of Georgetown. The paintings were shown on makeshift easels and hung from the rafters of the gallery to make an impressive display. The quality here seems to improve each year.

From copies of Christmas cards the painters have progressed to painting actual landscapes, work

ing from slides, still lifes and even portraits. Among the latter was a striking likeness of Rudolph Spielvogel, painted by Mrs. J. Whitbair. The paintings by beginners displayed talent and those by the experienced painters a growing mastery of techniques.

Together in one section of the room were exhibits from the bookkeeping class, with an enrolment of 12 under Walter Pope of Georgetown, elementary, and an advanced typewriter with an enrolment of 15 under high school commercial teacher William Mitchell, and Basic English which is also taught in the high school but not under the auspices of the night school committee.

Ten Soft Chairs
The upholstery class of a dozen men and women was represented by 10 deftly recovered chairs. Teacher is again T. H. Briggs of Georgetown.

The business class arranged a beautifully set table with fancy sandwiches and cakes. Teacher was Miss Allan McCrae, R.R. 1 with 14 in the group.

Possible new courses were suggested at a table which displayed ceramics, flower arranging, ename ling on copper and leather craft.

Other classes which did not ex hibit included motor mechanics taught by Ron Brinscombe with registration of nine and welding taught by Al Zeravsky with an enrolment of 11.

After everyone had strolled past the exhibits, a program began on the platform.

"Fashion Show"
An annual highlight watched for with much anticipation is the fashion show when first time models, the sewing students ap pear briefly on the platform. Some mothers had made cloth ing for their children and the boys stole the show, as they gen erally do.

The two elementary classes were under teacher Mrs. G. H. Edwards of Guelph. The articles they had made by no means look ed elementary and included afternoon dresses, two-piece suits, fitted skirts, matching outfits and smart children's clothes.

The youngsters who came on stage were Margo Austin, two wearing a skirt and sweater, Kathy Turkosz, four brown cotton dress and skirt and Karen Cole, five in a three piece suit of bouclé, tooth suiting with a dressless vest.

Principal Speaks
The Acton Night School has now completed its ninth year and the committee would like to con gratulate both the instructors and students on the high quality of work shown in the display," said Mr. Hansen, addressing the crowd.

This form of the night school classes just completed has been more or less of an experiment. We departed from our usual six term, before Christmas, and six after a term of ten lessons be fore Christmas. The attendance has held up much better, with very few absences as compared to some classes which previously dropped more than 50 per cent in the after-Christmas term. By having the term of 10 lessons before Christmas there was far less conflict with the curling activities, as well as had road and weather conditions."

Change Dates?
The committee would like an expression of opinion from the students as to the desirability of continuing on this basis next year.

"We have completed this term of classes with a small surplus and hope to continue this in the future. Our annual meeting will be held some time in January, and we would like a good attendance and new ideas."
