## Get 137 Common Hazards In Fire Inspection Blitz

A blitz inspection of 72 Oakville commercial buildings during Fire Prevention Week rooted out 137 common fire hazards, members of the Halton Fire Prevention Bureau learned.

Lack of fire extinguishers, poor housekeeping and lack of waste containers were found to be the most common of the 14 types of hazards found, accounting for 78 of the 137 hazards. Overfusing and improper use of extension cords were also reported frequently.

Inspectors Help  
The blitz inspection is an annual event sponsored by the county Bureau. Each year the blitz is held in a different municipality, with local insurance agents and insurance company inspectors assisting the firefighters.

The hazards and the number of cases found were: overfusing 11, extensive use of extension cords 12, lack of waste containers 22, insufficient exit lights 5, lack of oily rag containers 10, improper storage of flammable liquids 8, poor housekeeping 22, lack of fire extinguishers 34, smoking in a prohibited area 1, faulty electrical fixtures 6, garages under fire escape 1, fire extinguishers not properly maintained 2, fire exit doors blocked 2, and fire exit

doors opening the wrong way 1.

Potential Fires  
"It is time something was done to do away with more of these common fire hazards," members agreed when the report was read at the meeting. Each one of these "little" hazards was a potential fire. Unfortunately, the fire departments in most municipalities do not have sufficient time to inspect every home, store or industry. So it's up to the owners to clear out any hazards.

Others items of business at the Bureau's meeting: Arrangements were made to show the Bureau's fire prevention slides to the Niagara District Firefighters' Association, at a meeting at Virgil on November 29.

Order 15,000 Tags  
15,000 Christmas tree fire safety cards — emphasizing Christmas fire safety with trees and decorations — were ordered. They will be distributed free to Christmas tree dealers during December.

The Bureau accepted with regret the resignation of its lone honorary member, former District Fire Chief Alf Peacock of Burlington. Members praised his five years of service to the Bureau, and his untiring work on the annual poster contest and other committees.

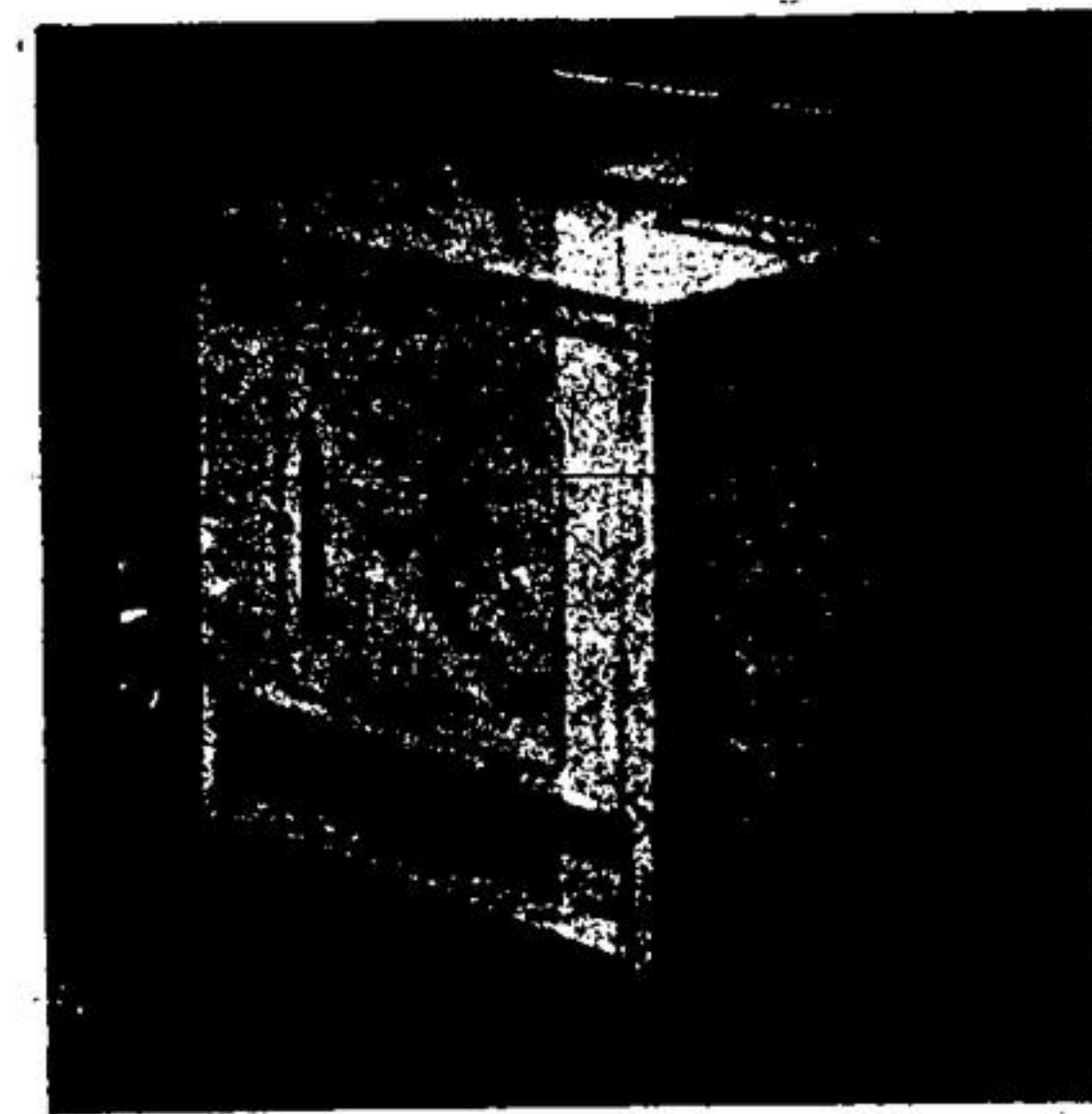
