

Gardhouse, Alexander, Ford, Merry Win Top 4-H Awards Night Prizes

Carolyn Gardhouse, Bill Alexander, Delmar Ford and Bob Merry were awarded top prizes at the tenth annual 4-H Club awards night, held at the Williams Avenue high school in Milton, Friday evening. About 111 members from 16 different clubs within the County received presentations.

Miss Gardhouse of R.R. 5, Milton, was awarded the J. E. Whitelock trophy for her outstanding record in 4-H Club work since she first became a member. As the winner of this trophy, the pretty 19 year old was Halton County's delegate to the National 4-H Club Week, which centred around the Royal Winter Fair held in Toronto in November. Miss Gardhouse, who has completed 16 projects, was also awarded the Ontario Shorthorn Club Special, a pin; the Central Ontario Cattle Breeders' Special, a pen; a Beef Showmanship Award, \$4, and an award as a member of the Beef and Dual Purpose Calf Club.

Year's Best
Bill Alexander was presented with the Courtney Agnew Award as the outstanding club member for the year. Mr. Alexander was also given the Central Ontario Cattle Breeders' Special, a pen; the Ontario Jersey Club Special, a blanket and certificate; and cash awards as a member of the Corn Club, the Grain Club, the Tractor Club and the Jersey-Guernsey-Ayrshire Calf Club. Mr. Alexander has completed 16 projects.

Delmar Ford was awarded the Hamilton Spectator travelling scholarship for having completed 22 projects, and being the top project completer now enrolled in the club. Mr. Ford was also presented with the Dairy Cattle Trophy (high score in judging dairy cattle); the Central Ontario Cattle Breeders' Special, a pen; \$2 for the Halton Holstein Calf Club and cash awards as a member of the Tractor Maintenance Club, Grain Club and Senior Holstein Calf Club.

In his address to the gathering Warden C. A. Martin noted that "4-H Club work is a major effort in the Agricultural Education of these students."

"CHRISTENDOM ASTRAY"
(First in a three-part series)
In challenging the validity of church teaching, we are aware that the majority of people will consider the Touch-Stone to be presumptuous, arrogant and conceited. All things considered, this would appear to be a reasonable conclusion. But suppose it could be shown, clearly shown, that the Bible foretold in unmistakable language that the Christian community, in very early times, would become hopelessly infected with "FABLES" or pagan beliefs; that this apostasy (or "falling away") would grow progressively worse and continue to the very Advent of Christ who would "sweep away the refuge of lies" — would this not put the Touch-Stone in a very different light? That the Bible, has, indeed, foretold just such a departure from Divine Truth can be clearly seen in the following testimonies from Holy Writ: —
