High School Highlights

As reported earlier, the Grade 11's went to Toronto on Friday, Dec. 14, to the museum. We left school about 9:30 a.m. and went in Tyler's Transport buses. Arriving at the museum at 11 a.m., we were directed to the cloakrooms, and then formed in two groups, one starting in the Early Egyptian Gallery and the other in the Greek Gallery. Then we changed guides and saw the half we didn't see before. The tour was over about 12:30 p.m. and we returned to the cafeteria for lunch.

After lunch we were given free time to roam the museum and to look at the exhibits that interested us. Meeting again at 1:45 p.m., we got into the buses and returned home. Mrs. Rogers, Mrs. W. Dubois and Mrs. C. Leatherland accompanied us.

Golden Age
Of special interest to 1962 visitors is the renovated Grecian room. Toronto painter and sculptor, Miss Sylvia Hahn, has captured the splendour of the Golden Age. Pericles, in her painting of the Parthenon frieze. The niches feature scenes of humans and centaurs in combat, of citizens on parade during the Panathenaic Festival, all figures done in brilliant variegated hues. In one corner is the replica of the gold and ivory statue of Pallas Athena that stands in the cella of the Parthenon.

Famous Temples
The model of the Acropolis with its famous temples, Parthenon, the Erechtheum and the Propylaea, and the altar at which sacrifices were made, all which were added a few years ago, are still of paramount interest to visitors.

Smaller Men
So particular have been Toronto sculptors, that their big worry now is whether or not the new model of the Athenian hoplite represents the true actual size of the Greek man. The Athenians were light and supple, supposedly smaller than modern American men.

Two Wins
Also reported last week was the fact that the senior and junior basketball teams would travel to Lorne Park and meet their teams. This we did and beat both teams. The senior score was 21-19 and the junior score was 18-14. Last Friday night the seniors played the old boys and lost 42-25. Well, you can't win them all! 77% Pay Taxes In Nassagaweya

About 77 per cent of Nassagaweya's taxpayers have paid their township taxes to date, clerk Don McMillan reported Wednesday. He was instructed by council Monday to prepare a list of lands liable for tax registration and have them listed by the end of the year, when the tax roll for 1962 is completed.

Council issued a 1963 gravel pit license to Campbellville Gravel Supply Ltd., a new pit operation on Five Sideroad at Highway 401. Members heard a report from the school attendance officer, listing no serious problems.

The resignation of Omar Vansickle from the planning board was accepted, and former councillor Charles Thomson was named to the Grand Valley Conservation Authority for 1963.

The clerk was instructed to seek information from the town of Milton about a water drilling test at the Kelso Dam area, so the Township will be better informed on the project.

Take Over Park
The township is taking over the control of the ball field and grandstand in the community centre at Campbellville, and has applied for a \$5,000 grant toward the project from the Community Centres Board.

At the close of the meeting, thanks were expressed to the township officials, and retiring Reeve John A. Milne was given a vote of thanks for his years of service to council.

Meet in Barn By Roaring Fire

Despite below-zero weather, Halton County Museum Board members met inside the renovated barn at Kelso Monday afternoon, sitting muffled in overcoats around the roaring fire in the large new fireplace. Candles were burning in antique lanterns and candlesticks and there was even a Christmas tree. The fireplace has just been completed. It is faced with stones gathered from mills all over the county and a "directors" will be placed beside the stones later.

It was exactly six months ago that Halton Newman came to the empty barn, before the sand blasting had even begun. Now there are two rooms — the former stable and former cow barn — filled with precious objects in Halton history with old carriages and larger items upstairs.

A workshop is in constant use. There are 1200 pieces on display, 70 per cent gifts, and the rest on loan. Attendance since July 15, date of the unofficial opening, has been about 4,500. Many still come each weekend, and since there is no gate admission to the conservation authority park now, it was decided to charge a slight admission fee.

Major Newman says he will be on hand during the day in case there are callers. Cold doesn't deter people interested in antiques.

A bedroom has been set up, simulating roughly the 1840s to 1870s.
