But would a buffalo do as well? The trouble is that we Canadians import too much for our own good. We are, in fact, the world's greatest importers of

manufactured goods. Look at these figures which show the average yearly expenditure on imported manufactured goods for the people of four nations:

Canadians-\$235 per person. Americans-\$35 per person. British-\$/5 per person. West Germans - \$60 per person.

If each of us reduced our import buying by just \$100 and diverted that money to the purchase of Canadian products, the province of Ontario would gain 600,000,000 vital dollars which would help provide 60,000 new jobs !

Every consumer should satisfy himself that there is no Canadian equivalent before he reaches out his hand for an imported product. By becoming "label conscious," he will probably find that often habit has led him to the imported product. The Canadian product, alongside, may be just as good. Buy that, and help create the 60,000 jobs that Ontario needs for the prosperity of all its people.
