Camera Gift Sure to "Click"

If you're having problems choosing your Christmas gift list, a camera is a sure winner. A step up in price are the popular movie and 35 mm. cameras. Some cameras, for the amateur, have a lot of controls and are not too easy to use. Others are completely automatic.

Cake Icing Preserves Freshness

Christmas cakes are the delectable treat that has been passed on from generation to generation. The cake is made of raisins, currants and other dried fruits.

A cake may be used instead of a pudding. To do this brush the cake with one part sugar to one part water. To three parts of water add one part of sugar. Some people like to use a mixture of one part sugar to one part water. The cake should be kept for a few minutes to set. The cake is used if should be rolled in half-inch lumps and made the same size as the cake. The cake is then washed with one sugar to one part water and two parts of water. The cake should be kept for 24 hours, then dipped in a mixture of one part sugar to one part water. The cake is then put through a grinder and work for a minute. Add a tablespoon of lemon juice and a teaspoon of salt and gradually beat until smooth. More sugar may be added if needed.

To Make Ornamental Frosting
Put 1 unbeaten egg white into a large bowl. Sift in 1 pound of sugar and beat vigorously with a wooden spoon. Add 1 teaspoon of lemon juice and 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla. More sugar may be required. This icing is suitable for decorating with a piping bag.

Don't let your Christmas party be the warning shot by your local fire department. Keep that Christmas tree fresh and green by setting it in water and keep cigarettes and matches away from the tree.
