Mr. and Mrs. Vic Masters and family of Listowel spent New Year's in Acton visiting relatives.

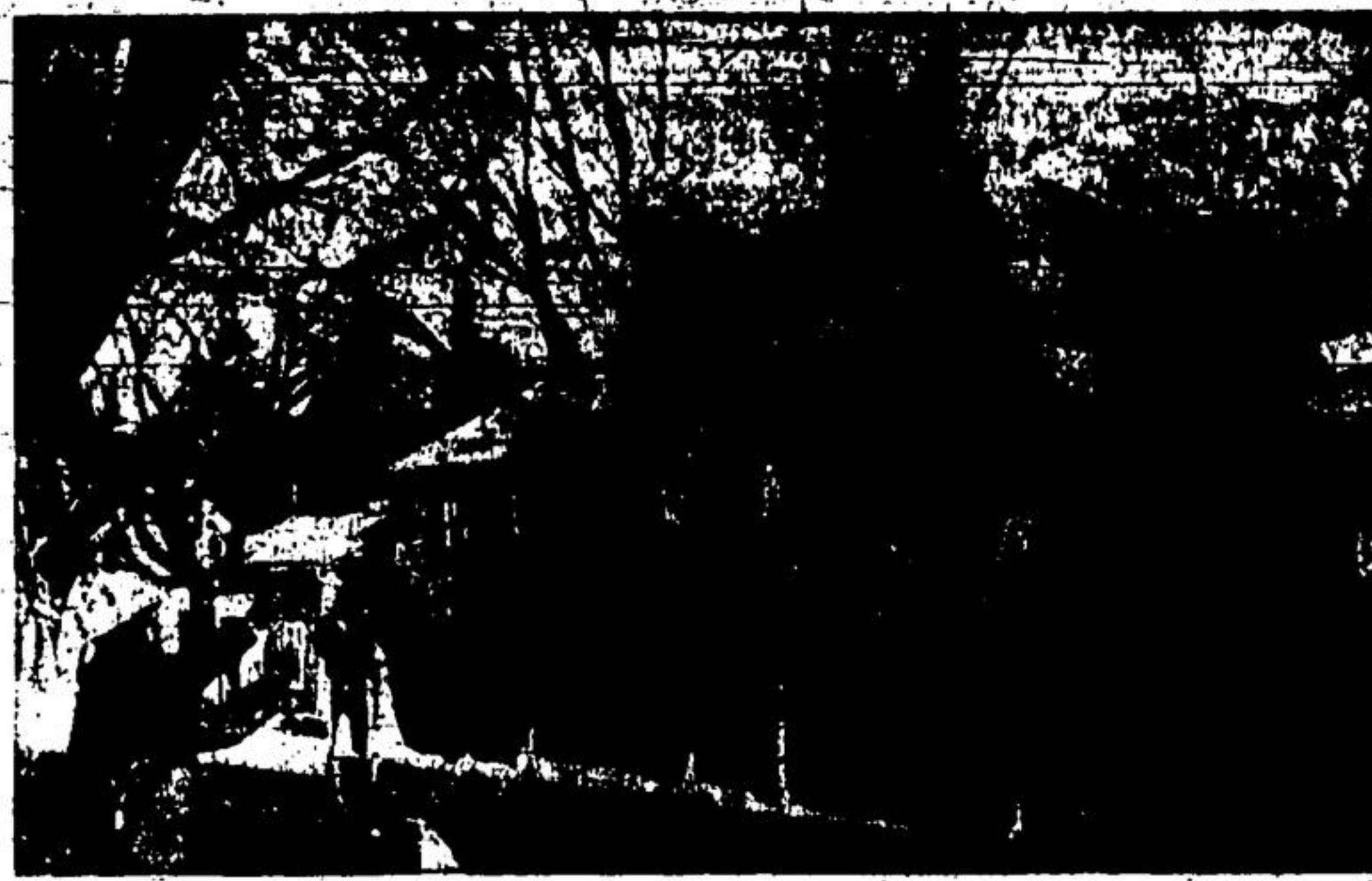
Mr. and Mrs. H. Roy Wainwright left on December 26th for Florida, where they will spend the winter months at Daventon Beach and West Palm Beach.
