Make Appointments at Inaugural Nassagaweya Will Study Procedure

Swearing in of the councillors and appointments to boards and committees occupied Nassagaweya Township's 1963 Council when it met for the first time on Monday. Rev. John Robertson took the chair vacated by retiring Keefe, Milne, and welcomed Deputy Reeve—William Coulter and councillors—Dr. B. D. Young, Roy Gordon and new councillor William Mahon.

Rev. Dr. Haddock of Ebenezer Church conducted a devotional and clerk J. M. McMillan swore in the members. Prior to the meeting, the Reeve entertained the members of council, clerk, minister and superintendent to lunch at Paul's Restaurant.

John Milne and Charles Thomson were appointed to Acton Fire Area, A. R. Service to Milton, Blanche Elliott was rehired as caretaker. Grant Campbell was named to the planning board for three years. William Coulter is planning board for one year.

Several new items of business were dealt with. Council decided to advertise for an assessor and relieve the clerk-treasurer of this added responsibility. It is hoped one can be hired by January 15.

The township is asking Department of Highways approval to call tenders for a new five-ton truck. The 1946 truck now in use will be traded in and the snowplow and sander will be switched to the new vehicle.

Council asked the clerk to write the North Halton O.P.P. and ask them not to impound cars on the residential property of Roy Wood in Campbellville. They suggested cars should be impounded on Mr. Wood's wrecking yard on the Guelph Line, where a licence covers the cars.

Hi-Pot-Lo Park Entry Razed Two Stone Chimneys Blasted

The old pavilion at entrance to Hi-Pot-Lo Park, Valley Road, has been demolished during the past few weeks and Tuesday forenoon, the two stone chimneys were blasted. The frame work of the building came from the horse stable in connection with the old wooden mill—Henry M. Cooper and Art Stumph have been doing the work.
