## Maurice Richard Here February 1

Hockey's international ambassador and one of the greatest players ever to lace on skates, Maurice (Rocket) Richard will be in Acton on Friday, February 1st, as part of a gala evening planned by Acton Lions in conjunction with Minor Hockey Week in Canada.

The Rocket, most colorful figure in NHL, arrives with his guest in the game between Acton Lions junior club and Toronto St. Michael's College juveniles planned for that date.

His visit was arranged by Alec Johnson, who in co-operation with the coach of the Lions, Barry Inscow, got in touch with Frank Selke Jr. in Montreal requesting a representative from Canadiens for the night.

Their fondest hopes were realized when Mr. Johnson received a letter from Mr. Selke last night (Wednesday) confirming that Canada's would have a celebrity in attendance and it would be the Rocket himself.

What role he will play in the event has not yet been ascertained.

Probably the most colorful player ever to play in the NHL, Maurice is also one of the game's great gentlemen. He set a mark of 50 goals in 50 games that will likely never be equalled.

Since his retirement he has acted as hockey's ambassador in every part of the world the game is played. His brother, the Pocket Rocket (Henri) is still with Canadiens.
