Glen Cooper Joins P.C. Race

Glen Cooper, well known business man, stated this week that he would stand for nomination at the Progressive Conservative Association convention to be held at Milton High School on January 25.

Mr. Cooper, in tossing his hat in the political arena, was the fifth candidate to make public his plan to stand for nomination.

1962. The other four candidates are: Esquimaux farmer Mac Sprawl; Campbellville farmer Roy Coulter, and two Burlington lawyers, George Kerr and Bill Hourigan.

Rumors were circulating this week about a possible sixth candidate, someone from the Milton area. E. Bradford Clements, a Milton insurance representative, said he had been thinking about it, but was not interested at this time.

He served with the Ontario Department of Highways for a period of 15 years and sat on the Ways and Means Committee of that Department for a two year term. He was engaged on airport construction work in conjunction with the Commonwealth Air Training plan during the war, after which the contracting firm of Grothand and Cooper Ltd. was formed.

Mr. Cooper is a past director and vice-president of the Oakville Kiwanis Club, a past vice-president of the Oakville Downtown Ratepayers' Association, a director of United Appeal, and served as Chairman of the Commercial-Retail section in the 1961 and 1962 campaigns. During a short period of residence in Sudbury, Mr. Cooper took a very active part in fund raising for the Y.M.C.A. building which was the first to be built in that city.

Held High Office An ardent Conservative, he has served consecutively as president of the Trafalgar Association for seven years, as president of the Halton County Association for 1959-60 and he is immediate past president of the Oakville Association.

The Coopers have deep roots in Halton County. John Cooper, a native of the Orkney Islands, who arrived in Canada in 1811, settled in Esquimaux Township in 1838. Glen represents the fifth generation that has lived in Halton since then.

Married, with two children, the Coopers reside at 1160 Lynbrook Road, Oakville. They attend Knox Presbyterian Church.

February Conversion Date For Number One Substation

Acton Hydro Electric Commission at their inaugural meeting last Thursday learned that the Joyce Swearing Co. had set Feb. 4 as the date for the conversion of No. 1 substation from 25 to 60 cycles.

The conversion of the transformer will increase the capacity of the substation and necessitate the installation of new switch gear to handle the increase. The superintendent was instructed to investigate alternative methods of having the conversion made on Saturday or Sunday preceding February 4 in an effort to minimize any inconvenience to consumers which might result in an hour and a half shut down on a Monday.

E. Tyler Chairman E. Tyler was chosen chairman of the Commission for 1963 with Commissioner Gordon McCutcheon selected as vice-chairman. Committees are, property, McCutcheon and G. Beatty; finance, R. Arbic and G. Beatty.

Past chairman G. Beatty reported that \$12,000 in bonds which matured in early January along with \$10,000 in surplus cash had been invested in 180-day treasury notes drawing interest at the rate of 3.984%.

Investigate New Truck Purchase of a new aerial truck at a price, for new equipment from \$6,100 to "anything you want to pay" was discussed. Chairman Tyler agreed to investigate the used equipment market before any decision is made. The finance committee was instructed to investigate three alternative proposals, submitted by Ontario Hydro, for a rate structure for electrical home heating. The property committee is to study and recommend a policy on a hot water heater exchange program.

The superintendent was instructed to obtain prices on the filtering of the oil in the transformers at No. 2 substation and at Micro Plastics and the H. K. Porter plant. Oil at No. 2 substation will be filtered at the time of conversion in February.

The superintendent was delegated to attend the Electric Contractors of Wellington dance at the Acton Legion Hall on February 8, to represent the Acton Commission.

Changes in insurance coverage were received and a special meeting will be called to discuss the proposal.
