So marvelous, in fact, is the similarity between these two systems, that corrupt Christianity is prophetically described in Rev. 17:5 as "Babylon the GREAT" - the superstitions of State Christianity exceed even those of the ancient pagan sys-Jesus said:- "By their fruits ye shall know them" Matt:

7:20. What are the fruits of the Christian Church? It is a notorious fact that Juvenile Delinquency, crime, immorality, etc. are on the increase never so alarmingly as in the so-called "Christian" nations of the earth. Is there a reason for this? Yes A recently concluded five-year survey established the fact that "even in Christian lands, not one person in ten thousand gives any serious attention to the Bible ... " This is the most damning indictment that could be laid at the foot of the Christian Church - as the result of her paganized theology, men everywhere have lost interest and confidence in the Infallible Word of God - the Bible. Next month, God willing, we shall see that apostate Christianity was to be headed up in one great religious institution who would be preeminently the "deceiver" of the nations, and styled prophetically - "the mother of harlots and abominations of the earth" - Rev. 17:5.
