Busy Soil, Crop Assoc. Annual Meeting

Jim McKay, Georgetown R.R. 3, was elected president of the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association at the annual meeting held on January 16. The meeting each year is designed to focus attention on phases of crop production. This year's theme was "Crop Use for Livestock Production".

Mr. McKay, head of the Animal Science Department at the Western Ontario Agricultural School, Ridgeway, was the guest speaker. In his remarks Mr. McKay suggested assessing crops on the individual farm for their production values. He suggested that the farm operator should cull the crops grown on his farm, similarly to the culling program carried out in livestock. He outlined recent changes in the handling of forage crops.

Denise Sinclair, Halton's delegate to the Ontario Land Use Year, reported on the trip. His illustrated address covered soil and crop practices in Western Ontario.

Hugh Beatty, Halton's winner in the Pasture Management Competition, was presented with a gold watch by Charles Harris of the Halton Co-Op Supplies. In addition, Mr. Beatty received awards for standing third in the Zone Competition of the Ontario Pasture Competition.
