Mac Sprowl Heads Esqueuing P.C.s New Ward System There Commended

A candidate for the Progressive Conservative nomination, January 21, Mac Sprowl was named president of Esqueuing Township Progressive Conservatively Association at the annual meeting in Stewarttown Hall, January 14. Past county president, Eric Clark of Georgetown conducted the elections and several speakers were heard before the meeting ended with coffee.

Other officers are vice-president Tom Hill, Glen Williams; chairman northwest area ward, polls 7, 8, 9, 13, 14, Fyfe Somerville, R. R. 2, Acton; chairman north-east area ward, polls 10, 11, 12, 15, 16, Merle Reid, Glen Williams; chairman south-east area ward, polls 17, 18, 19, 20, 21; William Brain, R. R. 1, Norval; secretary, Ross Ballantine, R. R. 2, Acton; treasurer, Wilmer Fryer, R. R. 4, Acton.

Guests welcomed were county president Gordon Beatty, Acton; public relations officer, Robert McLellan and candidates Roy Coulter, Glen Cooper and William Hourigan.

The "plan of attack" for the next election was outlined by Tom Sale of Oakville. He congratulated the Esqueuing association for setting up wards with five polls in a ward. This, he said, will break up the work and distribute it, giving more thorough organization in three areas.

A 42-page poll book on organization will be into every poll in Halton before the next election, he said.

He felt no candidate should bear the loss of an election. The organization can elect a candidate, but rarely can a candidate

be elected without organization, he concluded.

"The land of the tall pines..." that's Esqueuing, Mac Sprowl explained the Indian name when he spoke to the meeting. In 1821 when Esqueuing was formed, it had a population of 412 people; last year, the figure reached was 6,514 people.

In population in Halton county, Esqueuing is the fourth largest municipality in size, with Milton, Acton and Nasagaweya slightly smaller in population. Esqueuing, like other municipalities, is becoming more urban, with the villages of Glen Williams, Norval, Stewarttown, Limehouse, Milton Heights, Hornby and Peru all growing.

In his political research going back to 1928, Mr. Sprowl found Esqueuing township in 20 provincial and federal elections has had Liberal majorities in 13 elections. However, four of the five Progressive Conservative majorities have been since 1951, which is encouraging and is a great challenge to the association to keep organizing and working.

Spayside Provides Ottawa Decoration

Dr. Harry Harley has spent some time finding out what some young Canadians think about a national flag for Canada.

The Halton M.P.'s office in Ottawa is temporarily decorated with the artistic efforts of a group of grade 7 and 8 students from Spayside public school.

As a class project prior to Christmas, principal Colin Litch had the students paint the sort of flag they would like to see Canada adopt as a national emblem. The flag, together with covering letters of explanation, were mailed to Dr. Harley in Ottawa.

The school forwarded 32 designs, many of them featuring a maple leaf and others a beaver. One or two had a fleur-de-lis and several incorporated an outline map of Canada.

But there were also half a dozen students who like things pretty much as they are and sent in letters declaring that the Union Jack or the Red Ensign was fine with them.
