 Local police recommend that car-owners keep their liability insurance certificates in the glove compartments of their cars instead of their wallets. . . . that proof of insurance is readily available no matter who is driving the car.
 In a move-in-track-down-unsured motorists who haven't paid the \$20 fee, the Ontario provincial police and municipal police are conducting spot checks of motorists all over the province.
 When a motorist is stopped during a spot check he is asked to produce either a liability insurance certificate showing he has the minimum limits of liability insurance or, in the case of the un-

insured motorist, proof of payment of the \$20 fee.
 If the motorist does not have his liability certificate with him (or his proof of payment of the \$20 fee) he is given 24 hours in which to produce it.
 And if he is unable to produce it within this time, he may be subject to a fine of from \$50 to \$500.
