Tories Lay Campaign Plan

Plans for a full-scale federal help with P.C. organizations in each Halton municipality ready and willing to serve.

The party is holding a series of election workshops for poll workers who will cover the 282 polling ridings. Two will be held in Oakville, two in Burlington, and one in St. Catharines over the next three Saturdays, to acquaint each poll worker with his task in getting out a heavy vote.

Chairman Campaign

Campaign committee chairman is William Hourigan of Burlington, one of the four unsuccessful candidates in the recent provincial nomination.

George Kerr of Burlington, the remaining provincial representative, has already been campaigning although a provincial campaign has not yet been called.

Liberals Choosing Candidates

Tonight (Thursday) at the Milton Town Hall, about 300 Halton Liberals are expected to gather to choose their candidates for the federal election April 8.

Mr. Mullin ran in the 1959 provincial race against the late Stan Lee L. Hall, P.C., who held the Halton seat at Queen's Park for 19 years prior to his death last October. Halton riding has been

without a member of the legislature since his death. In the 1959 race, Mr. Hall won out by 700 votes.

Still No Date

No date has been set for a provincial election or a by-election in Halton, but a province wide vote is rumored for sometime this year.

Halton Liberal Association president Perry W. Nelson will be in charge of tonight's nomination meeting, and guest speaker will be Walter L. Gordon, Liberal candidate for the Toronto Davenport riding.

Three Seek Two N.D.P. Seats

Halton New Democratic Party has one federal and two provincial candidates in the running today, just a week before the party's joint federal/provincial nominating convention slated for Oakville Arena on February 28.

Ellis Fullerton, head of the history department at Lorne Park Secondary School and a resident of Oakville, has tossed his hat into the federal election ring. The party's candidate in the federal election last June, Carl Rouleau of Oakville, has withdrawn from the race due to health reasons.

Newcomer

Thomas Mills of Oakville, who announced last week he would seek the provincial nomination for the N.D.P., has been joined by some competition. William Gillies, a Cities Service employee at Oakville, has also joined the race for the party's nod in the provincial race.

Mr. Fullerton, born in Toronto, is an honours graduate of University of Toronto in Modern History. For some time he was sports editor and announcer for an Ottawa radio station, and the Physical Education director for Preston High School. For several years he has taught History in high school, and for the past three years has been at Lorne Park Secondary.

His wife Evelyn is also an honours grad of U. of T. in English Language and Literature. They live on the Ninth Line, Oakville, with their two sons, Scott 2, and Ross, one month.

Adopt \$1,250 Budget For Fire Prevention

A 1963 budget of \$1,250 was approved by members of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau at their February meeting in Milton.

The budget includes \$900 for the Bureau's fire safety education program — including literature for distribution, films and colored slides, newspaper and radio advertising and publicity and trophies for the annual grade five poster competition in the schools.

Another \$200 is marked for the special Christmas fire safety program and the commercial and industrial inspections during Fire Prevention Week in Milton and Burlington. The remainder will be used for office supplies and stationery.

The Bureau has approved the purchase of 4,000 fire telephone cards and "fire door" signs to be placed in industries and stores. These will be distributed soon by Chairman of the Western Ontario Section and an executive of the Canadian Figure Skating Association.


