At Annual Banquet

Halton Plowmen Elect S. May

The Halton County Plowmen's Association held their annual banquet and meeting at Bethel United Church, Drumquin. Guest speaker, Jack Carroll, a farmer, secretary of the Ontario Plowmen's Association and presently the manager of the Brampton Branch of Halton and Peel Trust, explained the importance of plowing matches to the members.

Mr. Carroll noted that matches first began with the early settlers and that the first reorganized provincial matches were held in 1913, just outside Toronto. Throughout



his speech he stressed the importance of plowing matches to good farming. "As long as farms are needed to supply food," he said, "necessary farming skills must be developed, and through plowing matches these skills are developed."

Step Up Diplomacy
In closing Mr. Carroll noted the International Plowing Matches do much to improve relations between countries of the world, and he suggested that if nations would step up their diplomacy and cut down on armament, the dangers of war would decrease rapidly.

John Wilson thanked the speaker for his interesting and informative talk.

Secretary J. A. Francis read the minutes of the last meeting and they were adopted. The financial report for 1962 was read by Mr. Francis, showing the Association has a balance of \$447.45. Expenses totalling \$1,520.68 had been paid during 1962.
