Recommend Time for Reading At Church Fellowship Meet

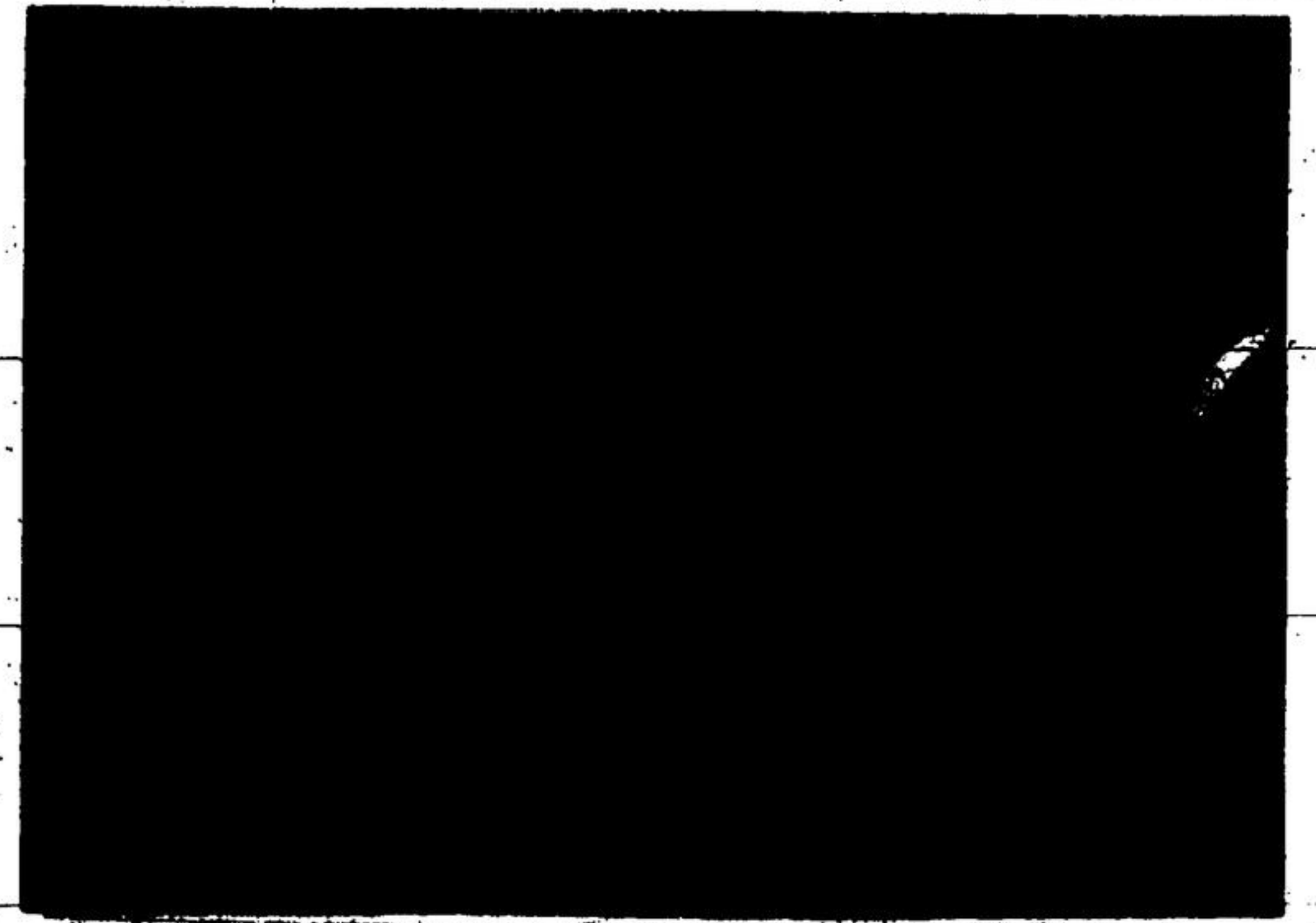
