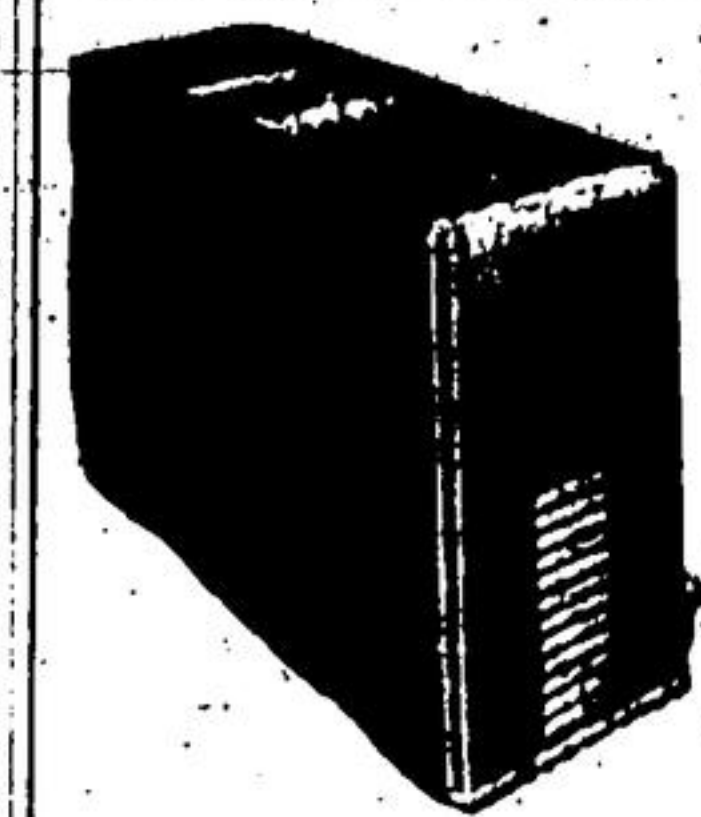
Visitors Meeting in Community News

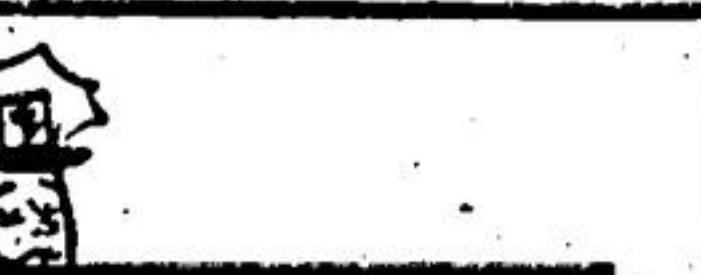
