

Name N.D.P. Provincial, Federal Candidates

Two Oakville men, Ellis Fullerton and William Gillies, were chosen as standard bearers for the New Democratic Party when they gathered in the room of the Oakville town hall on Thursday evening.

Mr. Fullerton, a 44-year-old South Peel Secondary School history teacher, is making his political debut as the N.D.P. provincial candidate in the April 8 election. He was successful in his bid for the nomination through a campaign of door-to-door canvassing and public meetings.

Mr. Fullerton stated that the Liberals advocated their position as a party of reform, and the N.D.P. is the only reform party left. He stated Canada needs economic planning, a National Investment Board, a Canadian Development Plan, a minimum wage law and a National Health Plan.

He described the unemployment situation in Canada as a disgrace. "The 540,000 people unemployed in Canada, represent the worst unemployment figures of any civilized nation," he noted.

Supporting the party's stand against nuclear arms, the nominee said "During World War II, a 20 per cent rate of destruction of attacking aircraft was considered not bad. When you add the fact that there is no defence of any nation attacked."

Mr. Fullerton noted, "The Liberal Party is making a great point of our supposed commitment to accept nuclear weapons. Where is the commitment?" he asked.

William Gillies, in his acceptance speech noted his participation in union activities had led him to political life. He praised the Saskatchewan system of government, automobile insurance and stressed that the costs of education should be distributed equally among all the forms of government, thus insuring a good education for every child.

Consider Joint County Jail Near Peel-Halton Boundary

The possibility of erecting a new jail near the Peel-Halton County boundary, to house prisoners from both counties, is presently being studied by members of Peel County Council.

The action follows repeated criticism of the 96-year-old Peel jail in Brampton, which is overcrowded and outdated. Halton's jail is more modern, however, and facilities for women prisoners have been added in the past few years. It is presently being experienced to give needed room for jail and medical offices.

Reeve J. McCollum of Peel County told fellow Peel councilors that maximum security was not needed for all local prisoners, and a minimum security or farm type institution in a less populated area might be ideal.

Halton County Council has been approached about the matter, but has not yet launched a study of the idea.
