Nigerian Missionary Speaks To Audience at Knox Church

Presbyterian missionary Ron McGraw, on furlough from Calabar, Eastern Nigeria, gave an illustrated talk on his work in Nigeria as chemistry teacher at Hopewaldell Training Institution, in Calabar, to a small audience at Knox Presbyterian church Wednesday. During the afternoon he addressed a 100 per cent turnout of the Knox Explorer group in the church.

Mr. McGraw, born and educated in Saskatchewan, went to Nigeria six months after graduating from the University of Saskatchewan and has remained there over two years as a missionary teacher for the Presbyterian Church.

During an interview, he stated the students in Nigeria were much keener about education than those in Canada and said the average cost to educate a student there is around \$250 per year. He also explained the average income per year for a worker in Nigeria is \$180 per year.

Mr. McGraw explained the cost of living is due to the type of living and eating habits of the people.

The missionary said there were 400 boys in the school he teaches at, ranging in age from 13 to 20. It is a boarding school and students start in a grade comparable to grade nine here but upon graduation qualify with two years of junior college. This is two grades above grade 13 high school.

The final two years of school are based on specializing in medicine, chemistry and zoology. When students complete their training they write an exam set by Cambridge University.
