**Deputy District Governor Addresses Acton Lions on Mental Health**

One out of every 14 people in Canada will require psychiatric treatment at some time in their lives, deputy district governor Graydon Laidlaw told the regular dinner meeting of Acton Lions club Monday night. And among professional people, clergymen, doctors, scientists, laborers or housewives can be hit by mental illness, he stressed.

Modern methods of research and treatment have done wonders for those placed in mental institutions but not enough attention has been focused on the subject. It costs taxpayer \$600-\$650 a year to keep a man in Kingston penitentiary but only \$400-\$450 is spent on mental health patients while the latter have done nothing wrong.

Mr. Laidlaw cited Aldershot Lunatics for the work they have done with mental patients in Harlow and asked Lions temperamentally suited to think of doing this work. When a man is released from prison, said the deputy district governor, he has the John Howard society and various other agencies to help him. Mental patients have no one. Often they've been deserted by friends or relatives who attach a stigma to mental illness.

On his annual visitation to Acton Lions, Mr. Laidlaw was introduced by Lion chief Al Lande.

Acton Lions received a report from the welfare committee that a wheel chair had been purchased to assist a lady in Acton.

Lion Vic Bristow reported to the club of negotiations with Happy Land shows for the annual spring carnival.

Lion John Grieteneder was appointed to serve as club representative on the newly formed Acton Safety Council which expects to be operating soon. The club also heard from Lion Vic Bristow on participation in the Acton Legion Club. Also included in the meeting was a sing song and readings from the report from the president's newsletter.
