### Deputy District Governor Addresses Action Lions on Mental Health

One out of every 14 people in Canada will require psychiatric treatment at some time in their lives, deputy district governor Graysian Laird told the regular dinner meeting of Action Lions Club Monday night. And anyone professional, people, clergymen, doctors, scientists, laborers or housewives can be hit by mental illness, he stressed.

Modern methods of research and treatment have done wonders for those placed in mental institutions but not enough attention has been focused on the subject.

It costs taxpayers \$600-\$650 a year to keep a man in Kingston penitentiary but only \$400-\$450 is spent on mental health patients while the latter have done nothing wrong.

Mr. Laird cited Aldershot Lunaticas for the work they have done with mental patients in Hamilton and asked lions temporarily suited to think of doing this work. When a man is released from prison, said the deputy district governor, he has the John Howard society and various other agencies to help him. Mental patients have no one. Often they've been deserted by friends or relatives who attach a stigma to mental illness.

There are five group leaders, Mrs. Tom Shields, Mrs. Clarence Rogerson, Mrs. Ted Hansen, Mrs. J. Bowman, Mrs. S. Reed and Mrs. Bob Bruce, with teams of volunteers. Each is assigned one district and Rotarians will be helping drive them to the streets they're assigned. Jan Leader of the Rotary club is organizing the Mothers March this year.
