Time Now to Forget the

Now that the dust has apparently settled on the county voting power and its distribution between north and south Halton, we sincerely hope the issue and the imaginary dividing line can be quickly forgotten.

In recent years there have been very few. issues of such a regional nature that support was split on a north-south basis. The question of voting power alone has been the most contentious problem of this type.

According to action approved by county council on Tuesday, the towns of Oakville and Burlington will have the same number of votes as Milton, Acton, Georgetown, Esquesing and Nassagawaya. If an increase in population in the north permits another northern vote, one also is added to the south. The reverse is also true.

In the event of a sharp north-south split on a proposal a majority of three votes will be required for approval. That is, if the south makes a proposal that is unacceptable to the north, they must swing the votes of at least one northern representative that holds two votes. The result would then be 19-15.

If there is an area of inequality remaining, it is that four representatives in the

south control 17 votes while the same number of votes in the north are divided among 10 men. It is this that caused some members to observe it was a lot of power in the hands of a few men.

For clarity in discussions it has been necessary to make frequent references to the north and the south. No one has ever bothered to define what is north of where and what is south of where. It is quite an imaginary line and it does ring of Civil War days. We do hope this imaginary dividing line can now be forgotten in the much broader task of doing what is good for the whole county.

The increasing importance of the county in local government is repeatedly emphasized as it extends its influence through countywide services. There is every reason to believe this will continue.

If the necessary private bill sponsored by Burlington and Oakville is now approved incorporating the solution arrived at Tuesday, perhaps the north-south interests can be minimized and the county interests elevated. It largely depends on the stature of the men sitting as county councillors.

A Serious Situation . . .

In this confinunity we face a serious docision. We say in this community, but the situation is really prevalent throughout length and breadth of Canada. As a country we need a government. The type of government we choose is to be a strong determining factor in the kind of country we plan to

The election campaign has barely warmed up yet but already we detect many "party" men torn in their loyalties and those lovalues are not limited to one or two parties. We have heard some suggest they just won't vote come April 8 because they ve never voted against the "party" yet.

Surely we are a rational enough people to realize we can't bury our head in the sand in ostrich fashion to escape a responsibility to wote for the candidate we feel can best implement those policies to which we

It is shocking in these days of mass media; television in every living room, radios in every home and newspapers on every cotfee table, to find there are citizens who are

not aware of the election and its significance. Surely as citizens we have an obligation to study the differences in party policies, the

stature of candidates and the ability of men to carry out policies in the national interest rather than a regional or individual interest. Surely as Canadians we do not expect to be bribed by our parliamentarians to obtain votes. Surely we have come to realize that this land of milk and honey will not produce its bounty merely by wishful thinking and the largest of elected governments, Surely as adults we realize sacrifice is sometimes. necessary and indeed essential it we are to play our part in the scheme of thing, ...

As individual citizens in this community and across the nation, we have an important role to play in the election April 8 But our role most extend even beyond that to be come one of participation and continuing in terest in the government of our country. To play that role adequately we loost analysis events and reach conclusions on the assues that will affect the future of the nation

For the past-three years, my wife and I have been using the "Weak No Trump" to help solve our opening bid problems. An opening bid of 1 No Trump show 12 - 14 points and balanced distribution. The hand may contain an unguarded doubleton. The weak no trump has several advantages, one of which is a rather negative one. If your partner does not open 1 No Trump, then the hand is either stronger than 14 points or has distri-. butional advantages.

Naturally, we have had some poor results because we have opened I No Trump, but until last Monday at the Acton Bridge Club, I cannot recall getting a good result because we did not open a regular. I No Trump with 16-18 points.

When the board was played at the other tables, South opened 1 No Trump. This is not good with a weak doubleton diamond but sometimes you cannot cover possibilities. Even 3 dia monds in South's hand would not change the final outcome. West led a low diamond and ev cry South went down one.

With our weak no trump, my wife could not open 1 No Trump and chose I club instead. West's overcall is very reasonable and when the bid came back to South, she doubled for take-out Although I would have liked to show my spades. I passed West's rebid of 2 diamonds. This ended the antion.

West can only make seven tricks. Even if he tries a rufting finesse in spades, which works, there is no reentry to the good spades. The dramond queen is needed to get to duminy for the spade tmesse. Notice that North-South must not lead hearts as that gives declarer a heart trick. It West is left to his own devices, he can never win a heart.


